NEW HAMPSHIRE MARRIAGE LAW.
Five days Must Elnapse Between Application for License and Marriage.

Concord, N. H., May 27.—The new law compelling notice of five days to the city clerk before he can issue a marriage license, enacted by the legislature at the recent session goes in effect on June 1, and City Clerk Chamberlain is expecting trouble on and after that date. The purpose of the legislature was to prevent couples from Massachusetts and other states coming across the border to be married expeditiously in New Hampshire, without restrictions as to the issuance of the license necessary.

Under the provisions of the new law a court can order the issuance of a license forthwith but it is probable that very few will avail themselves of that remedy.
