Added to the action of the alcohol in strong absinth contains 65 per cent) these essences have a most deleterious effect on the organisms, especially on the nervous system. Even small doses provoke a great irritability, which may easily lead heavy drinkers to crime. Epilepsy is more quickly developed among absinth drinkers than among the drinkers of the commoner kinds of alcoholic liquors.—Dundee Advertiser.
