**A NOVEL PAVEMENT.**

In the hunt for the most satisfactory street paving, the investigators have gone to tests which seem ridiculous. For instance, on some of the most traveled streets in Boston the seekers for most practical pavement have adopted what is known as the "onk-key" paving block, which is nothing more than a wedge-shaped piece of hard wood driven between the granite paving blocks already laid and left to protrude slightly above the granite. The steady pounding of the street traffic mauls these projecting pieces of wood down, thus making a combination wood and granite pavement. Boston's street commissioner goes on record as saying that he is satisfied it is a good proposition. Undoubtedly it combines the silent quality of wood pavement with the durability of granite, but it must make an oozy mess in wet weather and not calculated to be the best for public health.
