### APPLE GROWERS

#### IN CONVENTION

and its ancestry for three or four generations to develop best results and illustrated his theme by means of a distribution chart which dealt with distribution of progeny of vines, the efficiency of heredity, and the correlation of vine lengths and seed weights, etc. He advised isolating strains and growing a large number of individuals. The afternoon program was concluded at this time and a number of people noted the exhibits during the remainder of the time between the afternoon and evening program.

#### Advantages of Regions.

At the opening of the evening program, E. H. Hallett of St. Johnsbury, a lecturer for the state grange, spoke on "A Great Vegetable Exhibition," telling of the show recently held in Boston. After this talk M. C. Parritt of the United States Department of Agriculture gave an address on "Principal Fruit-Growing Regions of the East." The speaker told of the particular advantages of each region. The Northwest has, he said, dry atmosphere, long growing season, solid sunshine, supposed to be climatic factors in the high coloring of western apples, though one can hardly prove what gives them this coloring. The climate is beautiful, all the year. Northwest growers have a reputation for their fruit and packing and Hood River Valley apples pass the exacting English ports without inspection. But the Northwest lacks rain and has to irrigate. It is a long way from market. Land values are often extravagant. Labor is high.

"In the Piedmont or southern district, mountains protect the orchards, soil is favorable, lime stone streams are clear, rainfall is good; markets are close, one-third of the population of the country lives within a 500 mile radius. The cost of living is low. Labor is cheap but climatic conditions are favorable to fungus. Rocks make tillage difficult, many orchards are far from railroads.

"Western New York much like New England, has the great advantages of proximity to water. The crop is more certain and soil and climate favors high quality and fine flavor in crops. The market is near and rain abundant if properly conserved. The season is rather short, the atmosphere sometimes too moist. The winters are severe and the price of labor high. A great era of apple planting has begun to offset the old farm orchard that is passing out. It is an open question whether the young trees will much more than replace the old orchards before they become a thing of the past but at the present planting rate they will.

"Apple consumption increases daily and provided one goes into the venture on a conservative basis and with thorough understanding apple culture is safe, and reasonable returns may be expected. "The East produces the finest quality of apples as compared with the West and has the great advantage of near markets. I would not deny the West but every man to his own country."

#### The Premium Awards.

Form—Should be smooth and regular and correct form for the variety, 15.  
Size—Moderate to large, not overgrown; good size is a sign of good culture, 10.

Color—Bright, clean and characteristic of variety, 20.

Uniformity—Specimens should be of same form, size and color, 20.

Quality—Includes both texture and flavor. Compare only with specimens of the same variety, 15.

Freedom from blemish—Discount for bruises, worm holes, etc., 20.

Total is perfection, 100.

#### COLE ARRESTED.

Complaints by New England Farmers Stirred Authorities.

Boston, Nov. 3.—As a result of the investigation by post office inspectors of a number of complaints made by farmers from all sections of New England, George F. Cole, a commission merchant doing business at 141 Atlantic avenue, this city, was arrested yesterday and after pleading not guilty before United States Commissioner Hayes was held in \$500 bonds for a continued hearing on Nov. 9 on the charge of using the mails in a scheme to defraud.

It is alleged by the post office inspectors that Cole has been investigated by the postal authorities on two previous occasions when prosecution was averted, they say, by Cole's settlement with his creditors.

The complainants, including Miss G. E. S. Kent, Warren, N. H., are small farmers who claim to have sold Cole apples, eggs and poultry. It is alleged that Cole quoted high prices for farm products, but would remit only about one-third of the market price to the producers. To some, it is alleged, he sent no money, and such persons are said to have received later a clipping announcing the death of Charles C. Cole, on which was written: "Died of heart failure. Did not leave a dollar."

#### FIFTY DROWNED.

Japanese Ship Lost in Typhoon—Only Two Saved.

Victoria, B. C., Nov. 3.—Advices brought by the steamship Cyclops tell of the loss of the Japanese steamship Shintsu Maru, formerly the Baron Cawdor, in a typhoon off Hainan island on Sept. 19 with a loss of fifty lives. Capt. Murase and a stoker were the only members of the crew washed ashore.
