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HOW BORDEN HURT CANADA

Alienated Friendship of United States

MR. CARTWRIGHT ATTACKS

A Blow to British Empire, He Says—The Cultivation of Good Relations Is of the Utmost Moment.

Ottawa, Ontario, Nov. 23.—"If there is one thing more than another that every Canadian statesman who is worthy the name ought to avoid, it is fostering or pandering to a spirit of hostility and animosity between Canada and the United States," said Sir Richard Cartwright, former minister of trade and commerce, in the Canadian Senate Tuesday in the course of an attack on the manner in which reciprocity was assailed in the late Canadian election.

"For months I could not take up a Conservative paper without seeing some slur or taunt or innuendo or scurrilous attack upon the government and people of the United States. I observed some little time ago that Premier Borden took occasion at a dinner in New York to express the remarkable good will and affection he entertained for the people of the United States. Had he made that statement while the Canadian election was going on, had he chosen to curb the attacks of his followers in the campaign and put a stop to the mode of slander which was then in progress, I would have held his remarks entitled to more consideration. It may interest the gentlemen of the opposition and Mr. Borden himself to know how these remarks were received in the United States."

Sir Richard read an American editorial extract from an American newspaper, which concluded: "Canada may congratulate herself upon having done more to estrange the two nations than she will be able to repair for many years."

"I fear," continued Sir Richard, "that expresses only too correctly the sentiment of a great many persons in the United States who were formerly well disposed toward us. I am afraid the mischief Mr. Borden and his friends have done is greater than they will ever be able to repair. Now and all my life long I have seen and felt that the greatest service the people of Canada could render to the British empire was to cultivate friendly relations with the great nation on the other side of the border. Do these people know; do these slanders of mud recall that the people of the United States are to-day close to a hundred million strong and within twenty-five years will reach a hundred and fifty millions? That is the kind of power, that is the sort of nation that these people think it wise and prudent and in the interest of the British empire for us to insult and estrange."

Sir Richard condemned as "ungrateful fools" those English public men who recently have been exulting at the downfall of the Laurier government which, he said, was the only Canadian government that had ever conferred a serious honor upon British arms.

Senator Lough, who speaks in the Senate for the Conservative government, declared that during the election American public men, from President Taft and Speaker Champ Clark, down to the humblest, had made it plain that behind reciprocity there was the ulterior purpose of leading Canada away from England to annexation with the United States.

Under the circumstances, Canadians could not be blamed for rejecting reciprocity, but there was no unfriendliness on the part of the Canadian government toward the United States, he said.

Washington, Nov. 23.—Maintaining that saccharin in small quantities is as harmless as sugar, pepper or salt, manufacturers of that substance yesterday appealed to the pure food board, composed of the secretaries of agriculture, treasury and commerce and labor, to amend their order prohibiting its use in foods on the ground that it is deleterious to health. The order becomes effective Jan. 1 and is based on a report of the referee board of the department of agriculture, which declares that saccharin up to three-tenths of a dram was harmless, but above that quantity injurious. The manufacturers yesterday asked that its use in small amounts be not prohibited. They were given leave to file briefs after which a decision will be reached by the board.

Washington, Nov. 23.—Essential factors in any new trust legislation to be passed by Congress, were suggested to the Senate committee on interstate commerce yesterday by Eugene G. Hay, a Minneapolis attorney, now one of the general appraisers at the port of New York. His suggestions were:

That corporations be prohibited from holding the stock or owning or leasing the property to other corporations in similar or related lines of industry; that the directors of a corporation be prohibited from serving as directors of competing corporations; that the capital of corporations be paid in full before they are permitted to operate in interstate commerce; that no trade agreements be permitted that will interfere with free and open competition; and that directors of a corporation must be residents of the state in which it is organized.

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

A REAL MYSTERY. Judge Fitz Preyed Upon by Invisible Enemies.

Wakefield, Mass., Nov. 23.—Completely baffled by the deceptions being committed at the home of Judge Frank E. Fitz, the police force of this town does not know what way to turn. For four consecutive nights, the home of the judge has been visited by some "unknown," and during Tuesday night the "unknown" made two calls while a couple of police officers were on guard, unaware of his presence.

To catch this person, the entire police force, consisting of two regular patrolmen and eight reserves, was on duty Tuesday night. Two of the men were assigned to the grounds of Judge Fitz residence.

Officer Joseph Preston kept his eyes glued on the rear door. At about 10:30 Judge Fitz called to him and when he reached the rear piazza he was dumbfounded to see that the door knob had been removed. The police officer was positive in his opinion that the door was not tampered with on the outside.

At 5:30 o'clock yesterday morning, it was found that the front door knob and door plate had been removed, how, the police could not explain.

Yesterday Judge Fitz asked for and was granted the privilege of going armed. His family was also given this permission and instructed to shoot any suspicious looking character found hanging around the Fitz home.

Received Communion Yesterday in Prison at Richmond.

Richmond, Va., Nov. 23.—Henry Clay Beattie, jr., condemned to electrocution at dawn to-morrow in the penitentiary here for wife murder, received communion yesterday afternoon from his family's pastor, Rev. J. J. Fix, of the Presbyterian church. Present with Mr. Fix will be Rev. Benjamin Dennis of the Episcopal church, Beattie's personal spiritual adviser. The prisoner's father was the only other person participating in the communion service.

London, Nov. 23.—The Persian government yesterday afternoon officially notified the British government that under its advice it would comply with the demands of the Russian ultimatum.

Orders had been given for the withdrawal of the gendarmes, who were sent by W. Morgan Shuster, the Persian treasurer general, at the instance of the national council, to seize the property of Shua Es-Sultaneh, a brother of the ex-shah of Persia.

The Persian government will apologize to Russia.

A new Persian cabinet will be formed to-day.
