Happenings of Interest From Different Sections.

Alonso Gocha of Springfield has filed a petition in bankruptcy with Clerk F. S. Platt of the United States court. His liabilities are \$516.06 and he has assets of \$50.41, of which \$52 is exempt.

The Congregational church in Irasburg caught fire Sunday, Jan. 7, and the edifice was considerably damaged by smoke, although the blaze was extinguished before it burned more than a hole in the floor. The janitor discovered the fire when he went to open the church for the evening service.

### GETS NEW INDUSTRY.

Rutland to Make Pond's Plasters, Patented in Many Countries.

Rutland, Jan. 16.—That Rutland is to have not only another factory but a new industry in the spring has been announced by Dr. Edmund M. Pond of South Main street, this city, inventor of Pond's plaster, which Dr. Pond has patented in all of the principal countries in Europe as well as Canada and the United States. Dr. Pond, as head of the Pond Plaster company, is now manufacturing the plasters in a small way in his office at his residence and in the spring a factory building will be built where perhaps 10 or 12 hands will be employed in the making of the plasters. It has not been decided where this building will be located.

### MISSING OVER 20 YEARS

Now His Relatives Ask for Appointment of Administrator.

Burlington, Jan. 13.—An administrator was appointed by Judge Macomber in probate court yesterday in the estate of Eugene Prim, a man who has been missing for more than 20 years. A sum of money is awaiting his heirs in the Winoski Savings bank, not a large sum, but too large to be overlooked. The absent Mr. Prim was the grandson of Paul Brunelle, a Milton man, who died several years ago. Prim's share of the estate, was \$29 which has remained in the Winoski Savings bank ever since, the accumulated interest being added making the amount about \$40. Prim's sister, Mrs. Clara Rhodes of St. Albans, asked recently to have an administrator of her brother's estate appointed, and the court here appointed her son, John E. Rhodes, to the next of kin are Mrs. Rhodes and her brother, Fred Prim of Brooksville, Me.
