Harry F. Stafford, formerly of Rutland, the orchestra leader at the City's New academy, Scranton, Pa., has signed a three-years' contract to direct an orchestra of several men at the City's New Bijou theatre, New Haven, Conn., which opens in May.

The Allen farm, at Wells River, which was purchased by lumbermen last fall, has thus far yielded about 600,000 feet of wood and lumber, according to report, and only about half of the trees have been felled. The lumber has been sold for \$15 per thousand feet.

A sugar house in Fairfax, together with several hundred buckets, an evaporator and several storage tanks, the property of H. C. Rugg, was burned last Monday afternoon. Mr. Rugg had been engaged in cutting lumber at the sugar house and the fire caught from a chimney spark.

A block of granite 4 1/2 feet square and 32 feet long and weighing 62 tons was shipped recently from the Woodbury Granite Co.'s quarries in Woodbury to Hardwick. It was the largest piece of granite ever brought into the village and will be used for the shaft for a soldier's monument to be erected in Bloomington, Ill.

It is expected that the traveling tuberculosis exhibit will leave the state laboratory of hygiene for its annual tour of Vermont within a few days. Several additions and improvements are contemplated in the features of the display. The state health department has the tour under consideration and is making out the itinerary.

John Dyke, who is employed in the Central Vermont roundhouse at Burlington, was badly burned about the legs and one-shoulder Wednesday, when a quantity of steam escaped from the base of an engine. He was taken to the Mary Fletcher hospital and so serious is his condition that his recovery will be a matter of many weeks.
