Burlington, April 30.—A hearing was held yesterday in county court in the case of State vs. Emily Langlois, a scire facis proceeding brought by State's Attorney Shaw to ascertain why Mrs. Langlois should not pay \$1,000 bail declared forfeited, which she furnished for her son's appearance at a recent term of court to answer to the charge of perjury. Langlois is now serving a state prison sentence for his crime, which was perjury committed in the probate court, the respondent having falsified as to the amount he received for the sale of real estate in an estate of which he was administrator.

Happenings of Interest From Different Sections.

The supply of chestnut and pea coal in Brattleboro has been reduced to practically nothing.

At the annual village meeting in Essex Junction the citizens turned down the proposition to install a fire alarm system. The water commissioners were instructed to investigate the water system.

One of the girl inmates of the state industrial school, Vergennes, died Saturday morning of membranous croup following an attack of measles. The body was taken to her home in Burlington.

Lack of interest is probably responsible for the passing of Valley lodge, No. 42, Knights of Pythias, organized in Brattleboro last fall. Though nothing has been done in the matter of surrendering the charter, action will probably be taken at an early date.
