**A DESERVED VICTORY.**

The victory of the state of New Hampshire in establishing its right to acquire the famous Crawford notch in the White mountains means the preservation of one of New Hampshire's greatest assets. One can readily imagine what a woeful appearance this beautiful place would take on when denuded, or partly denuded, of its forest growth. The rocky sides of the notch are now concealed in smooth and gently rounded outlines of acres of tree tops, making a splendid sight which calls forth expressions of wonder and delight from the visitor. But remove this covering of trees, and you would have an ugly mass of protruding rock staring out in unrelieved bareness, a view which would serve to repulse the vision and, consequently, drive tourists to places not despoiled by man's hands. Hence, the decision just announced by the New Hampshire supreme court, giving the governor and council, representing the state, the right to take the property by eminent domain is reassuring. It will result in not only the preservation of the beauties already found in the notch, but also in enhancing those beauties, we expect.

**War on the Fly.**  
If one may judge from the number, frequency, intensity and ubiquity of the declarations of war against the common house fly, the day should not be very far distant when that pest will have been banished from North America. Throughout the United States, health officials and other sanitation experts, ably and enthusiastically supported by the press, are reiterating their oft-repeated warnings to "swat" him, her or it at sight. The public generally, too, appears to have conceived a proper and abiding hatred for the fly, and it is not a merely passive hatred, either. Similar conditions exist in Canada. Take Toronto by way of illustration. The medical officer of health, as the head of the municipal health department is called, has issued warning and advice to the people of the city, calling upon them to pursue a steady and relentless warfare against the house fly. Promptly the Toronto World indorses the health officer's propaganda and forwards the slogan: "Swat the fly." And so it goes. North and south, east and west, the fly is recognized as a disturber, going about seeking whom he may devour, endangering the health and lives of the millions, and deserving extermination on general principles. At this rate, the insect pest now known as the common house fly will eventually be regarded as the extremely uncommon house fly. Speed the day.—Manchester Union.
