ABOUT THE STATE

Happenings of Interest From Different Sections.

"Guard" Ridlon, who was struck by a train while attempting to cross the railroad tracks at Gorham, N. H., in his automobile, and was instantly killed, was in the meat business at Island Pond for a time.

Arthur Tewksbury of Worcester was stricken with apoplexy as he was separating the milk last night and lived but a few minutes. Mr. Tewksbury was born in Calumet in 1849 and had always been a farmer.

The body of Miss Helen Smythe, who was drowned with her brother and Miss Hazel Ellis, in St. Johnsbury on Memorial day, was found by a diver Friday about half a mile below where the canoe upset. It was lodged on a snag in the center of the river.

During the thunder storm last week Tuesday, a cow belonging to Charles May of Woodstock, which sought shelter under a tree, was killed and a pair of horses being driven in Plymouth by their owner, A. D. Messer, were both struck by a bolt of lightning and killed. Mr. Messer was uninjured.

Large numbers of caterpillars are appearing near St. Albans, particularly about the shores of Lake Champlain. Their work has already made itself noticeable, according to report in that section, many trees having been stripped of their foliage. To the west, particularly in the section about Ottawa, reports show large numbers of the worms.

The dwelling house of Harmon S. Eldred in Sheldon caught fire last week from a torch of gas saturated with kerosene, used to burn worms' nests near a detached and well roof. The shingles were nearly all burned off before neighbors were able to extinguish the flames, and the loss was about \$200, covered by insurance.

Hugh Keefe, who has three times escaped from the state hospital for the insane since he was confined there for insanity, and fell upon Friday at six feet and four inches above low water mark, while a year ago it was only three feet four inches. The high water is making all kinds of trouble for the boat men, not the least of these being the difficulty of loading automobiles onto the boats from the lower wharfs.

IN THE CASE OF FLETCHER vs. ROBINSON,

Several local physicians were to testify and hence this motion. The court sustained the motion and the case goes to the supreme court.

James White of South Manchester, Conn. was struck and instantly killed Saturday morning at the depot at Brattleboro. According to report, the man was ejected from the Central Vermont train No. 87, connecting with the north-bound morning sleeper No. 1 at Brattleboro, for refusing to show his ticket.

He was taken from the train about 10:30 o'clock. He had in his possession a ticket for an Ontario point and had a trunk check for the same point. Papers in his possession gave his name and address. It is thought White must have wandered onto the tracks, where the accident occurred.

Frank Franzoni, the five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. Franzoni, was drowned in the house of correction pond on 8th of city near the Academy street wharf, on Friday afternoon. At the time of the accident, the child was playing on a raft, in company with several other children. Among his playmates were his twin brother, Harry, his sister, Mammie, about nine years old, and another little girl. According to a person who witnessed the accident, the boy tumbled from the raft when it was about ten feet from the shore. He made an effort to swim, but sank before his playmates could obtain help. The child's body was recovered in six feet of water.

Four bellboys are to divide \$6,000, the estate of Mrs. Hannah Dwight Green. The fortunate ones are Edwin J. Greenwood and Frank Dorgan of Littleton, N. H.; A. Finn of Woodstock, and George Hollenberg of Boston. Mrs. Green was 81 years of age when she died in a Springfield, Mass., sanatorium recently, and her will was offered for probate in Albany, where she always resided. In the will, Mrs. Green speaks of the kindness and courtesy of the boys and leaves her entire estate to them. Mrs. Green's nearest relatives were her nephews and nieces, the children of the late Mrs. Samuel Bowles of Springfield, Mass.
