### ABOUT THE STATE

Happenings of Interest From Different Sections.

Rutland is to have a society circus, the event being planned for the benefit of the teachers' pension fund. There will be no session of schools.

Mrs. F. W. Brewster of Huntington was badly burned about the arms and chest Monday by upsetting a kettle of hot lard.

The new Congregational church at North Pownal, replacing the structure destroyed by fire, was formally dedicated Sunday afternoon. It was in the basement of the old structure that James A. Garfield and Chester A. Arthur taught Sunday school while students at Williams college.

### SOCIALIST PLATFORM.

A Resume of That Adopted by Recent State Convention at Bennington.

The platform adopted by the Socialist party at its state convention in Bennington Saturday, June 8, "affirmed the principles of international socialism," adopted at Indianapolis; endorses Debs and Seidel as party standard bearers; approves the work of Representative Berger in Congress; reiterates the declaration that socialism is the only solution for the problems which create social unrest; reiterates the declaration that they are not opposed to private property and repudiates the charge that they stand for equal division of property; declares for equality of opportunity to "put an end to the system which enables a privileged few to oppress the many"; and to exploit their labor and their needs.

Further, the platform declares that Socialism is not a scheme to be adopted, but a stage of civilization to be reached; deprecates "the inefficiency of the present industrial system"; scores the Republican and Democratic parties for insincerity; claims that socialism offers constructive progress in the conflict of interests between the people and a despotic plutocracy; urges the ownership and control of industry by the people; pledges the efforts of the party toward the betterment of the working class; endorses the progress of economic and political reform in the national platform; supports equal suffrage to women and initiative, referendum and recall; demands abolition of poll tax; demands prohibition of labor by children under 16 in factories, etc.; demands prohibition of employment of women and young persons of both sexes in factories, etc., between 6 p. m. and 6 a. m.; demands a maximum of eight hours' labor in factories, etc., and for all state and municipal employes; demands system of state insurance; demands reform of educational system; demands that the state "take all possible measures to provide work for the ever-increasing army of unemployed workers"; demands legislation to prevent any city or town from disposing of public franchise except by referendum; demands that all wages not exceeding \$15 per week be exempted from attachment.
