Of course, Vermonters would like to see one of their number occupying the vice-presidential chair. But what is the use of trying to delude ourselves into the belief that Gov. Mead has a ghost of a chance for the nomination? They don't select vice-presidential candidates from states of political nonentity as far as votes go; they select them from the states which have the votes. Vermont hasn't the votes, although it may have the men; hence, Gov. Mead's candidacy will receive little or no attention outside of New England. Gov. Mead's support of President Taft in the campaign will be lost sight of in the hurly-burly of the convention, if that is being counted on as a factor to aid his candidacy. So why not settle ourselves so that there will be no disappointment to us?

THE WORKING OF THE CURFEW IN HARDWICK.

A curfew law has been in vogue in the village of Hardwick for a week, and the Hardwick Gazette expresses the opinion that the law has worked well, there being few unattached children on the streets of the village after the hour of nine. If the village fathers are able to maintain the same respect for the curfew any considerable length of time, they will do what many other communities have failed to do and have been forced to acknowledge by repealing the curfew regulation. The theory back of the curfew is reasonable, both for the good of the young people and for the community; but in most cases it is impracticable, especially in towns and cities which are somewhat larger than Hardwick. Nevertheless, it is possible to have the law reasonably well enforced; and it is to be hoped that Hardwick is one of those communities and that the results of the first week are only an earnest of continued success. The streets are not the place for boys and girls after nine o'clock at night. If there is necessity that they be on the street, it can be proved easily; and the curfew regulation is not intended to meet those cases.

AMENDING THE VERMONT CONSTITUTION.

On June 12, The Times published a list of nine proposed amendments to the constitution of Vermont; and as the public may have been somewhat puzzled as to the purpose of the publishing, perhaps it may be well without further delay to state that the advertising of the proposed amendments was according to the constitution relative to amending that instrument. Section 25 of the amendments to the Vermont constitution stipulates that when the Senate shall by a two-thirds vote propose amendments to the constitution, and the House, by a similar vote, shall concur, such proposals shall be published in newspapers of the state prior to the convening of the next following legislature. Then, if the Senate and the House of that next legislature shall by a majority vote accept any or all of such proposals, the accepted proposals shall be submitted to a direct vote of the freemen of Vermont. In that referendum, such proposals as shall receive a majority of the votes cast shall become a part of the constitution. Therefore, the first two steps in the method of procedure have been complied with; the Senate has made pro-

proposals which the House has accepted, and the accepted proposals have been published in the newspapers of the state. It is now left to submit the proposals to the legislature next fall for ratification or rejection.

GODDARD'S LOYAL FRIENDS.

The demonstration of loyalty to Goddard seminary, as participated in by alumni and friends of the school at the graduation exercises yesterday, was quite remarkable, although, of course, the amount required to be raised before the building project could be started was not large. But it was the spirit manifested, rather than the amount sought, and raised, which made the demonstration somewhat unique. Doubtless had the amount desired been considerably larger, the subscriptions would have been raised to meet the larger sum. However, it needed not that greater sacrifice, to demonstrate that Goddard has many loyal friends among its own graduates, among those who are otherwise closely connected with the institution and among those who are interested in the development of educational life. That expression of loyalty will be reckoned, in value to the school, second only to the building itself which the subscriptions made possible.

As for the building, there can be no question of the value which it will be to the school. The institution has managed to get along on inadequate facilities for some years, while all the time the demands of modern education required greater equipment and, consequently, more room for the housing of that equipment; and, at the same time, the enrollment of students has taxed the capacity of the buildings available. These things have emphasized from time to time the need of another building. And now that demand is to be met. When the new structure is completed, it will relieve the congested conditions in the main school
