### ABOUT THE STATE

Happenings of Interest From Different Sections.

Mrs. Julia Bryan of Wisconsin has sent \$20 to the Cemetery association of Colchester to start a permanent cemetery fund.

Rev. Elmer Terry has resigned as pastor of the Advent Christian church at Castleton and expects to return to North Adams, Mass.

The mixed doubles tennis championship of the United States was won July 1 by Fred H. Harris of Brattleboro and Miss May Sutton of Los Angeles, Cal., at Pittsburgh, Pa.

A. C. Boardman, a section hand at Hardwick, was injured internally on Wednesday, July 3, when he was accidentally hit by a tie which he was helping put in place.

Rev. Dr. J. H. Coleman, superintendent of the Burlington district of the Methodist church, has received the degree of LL. D. from Willamette university at Salem, Ore. He was formerly president of the university.

The new Y. M. C. A. building in Rutland will be ready for occupancy by September 1, it is expected, and also that residents will be called together soon in public to discuss the financial end of the enterprise.

The J. T. Slack corporation of Springfield shipped a carload of abody wood to a mill in Maine recently by express, in a 60-foot Boston & Maine express car, the express charges being \$200 on the shipment. The Slack mill is now the largest in the world.

Frederick Hammond Knight of Ludlow was the only one of six boys taking the examination for entrance to the naval academy at Annapolis, which was held at Northfield recently. Knight had an exceptionally high mark, being over 90 per cent.

Shaw, who has been a member of the faculty of Burr and Burton seminary, Manchester, for the past three years, will not be connected with that institution next year, having taken the position of secretary to the executive committee of the Bennington County Improvement association, beginning his duties as such July 1.

Lightning Tuesday afternoon struck St. Bridget's church at West Rutland, shattering timbers on its steeple, stripping off part of the shingles and burning out a motor in the organ loft. Rev. T. R. Carly, pastor of the church, went into the building during the shower and found the woodwork on fire. With the lightning striking nearby, the fire was extinguished, with a probable loss of several hundred dollars.
