NO MORE MAIL BY FREIGHT

Stricken Out of Post Office Appropriation

\$2,500,000 MORE TO RAILROADS

Parcels Post for Second-Class Matter—Postal Employees Cannot Combine in Labor Unions.

Washington, July 24.—The postoffice appropriation bill, shorn of the good roads provision proposed by the house and embracing a revised parcels post system with charges based on zones of distance, was reported to the senate today by the postoffice committee.

The total appropriations proposed by the bill are approximately \$290,000,000. One of the principal increases is in the pay of railroads for transporting mails, the senate committee adding more than \$2,500,000.

In striking out the Shackleford good roads feature of the house bill, which provided for federal improvement of high-ways, the senate committee recommends a commission of three house members and three senators and provides for no highway improvements until this commission has reported.

The Barnhart amendment in the house bill for the regular publication of stockholders of newspapers and periodicals is changed to provide for publication once a year, when lists of the stockholders are required to be mailed with local postmasters.
