#### 2,000 MEN ON SLAYER'S TRAIL.

Potts, a Negro, Kills Two Men and Escapes.

Clarksville, Texas, Aug. 1.—Two thousand white men yesterday were searching for a negro, Leonard Potts, who within a week has killed two Texas officers. His latest victim was Sheriff Charles Stevens of this city, whom he shot on Tuesday night.

Fourteen negroes are in jail here. They are held on the suspicion that they know something about Potts' movements. Some of the imprisoned negroes are believed to be in danger of violence unless Potts is caught or their own innocence of attempts to hide the fugitive is quickly established.

### "HANDS OFF," IS COAST CRY

Senate Puts Up New "No Trespass" Sign

COVERING WESTERN WORLD

Aimed at Magdalena Bay, But Made All-Embracing—Lodge the Author—Action Justified by European Course in Balkans.

Washington, Aug. 1.—The Senate foreign relation committee yesterday action that amounts to a warning to Japan and all other foreign nations to keep hands off the shore of Magdalena Bay. The warning in fact is broader than this. It sets up the "no trespass" sign for the notice of foreign nations all along the shores of the western hemisphere.

Senator Lodge, by direction of the committee, reported the following resolution: "Resolved, that when any harbor or other place in the American continent is so situated that the occupation thereof for naval or military purposes might threaten the communications or the safety of the United States, the government of the United States could see without grave concern the possession of such harbor, or other place, by any corporation or association which has such a relation to another government, not American, as to give that government practical power of control for national purposes."

#### AFTER 2,000-MILE CHASE.

#### Northwest Police Capture a Notorious Rustler in Northern Canada.

Calgary, Alberta, Aug. 1.—Pursued for four months through the wilds of northern Canada by members of the northwest mounted police, Will Ropp, said by the authorities to be the most notorious horse rustler and cattle thief in the western country, has been apprehended and is in the barracks here today awaiting trial. The chase covered nearly 2,000 miles and was remarkable for the persistence with which the police followed the trail of the fugitive through the trackless north country. Ropp, tired of being hunted, finally gave up and confessed to a list of offenses which was a revelation even to the officers. His confession tells in detail of several hundred crimes, and Ropp adds the statement that he has probably committed as many more, details of which he has forgotten.

Hugh Duffy, who has been a successful manager of the Milwaukee club of the American association, has renewed his contract. Hugh will next year be leading his club on to the pennant.

Birdie Cree, who at one time played with the Burlington team in the Northern league, is now out of the Highlanders' line-up with a broken arm. Cree is resting at his home in Sunbury, Pa.

Rube Vickers is again due to return to major league ball. The Rube has been twirling wonderful ball for the Baltimore Orioles. Vickers has pitched in that city before, and the critics were never so loud in his praises as now.

#### HALF MILLION FOR EXTENSION.

#### Money to be Expended for Street Railway in Rutland County.

Rutland Aug. 1.—That 500,000 will be expended within eight months in extending street railway lines, in extending power transmission lines through the quarrying district and in further developing the public utilities properties of this vicinity, was the statement made today by W. S. Barstow, president of W. S. Barstow & Co. inc., of New York and president to be of the General Gas & Electric company, recently incorporated, when he also said that that corporation has now completed the purchase of 90 per cent of the stock of the Rutland Railway, Light & Power company, of this city.

The General Gas & Electric company, in which the W. S. Barstow & Co. interests predominate, was organized to take over the Rutland Railway, Light & Electric company—held on option by the Rutland company—and the Western Ohio Railway & Power company. The Western Vermont Light & Power company, an auxiliary to the Rutland Railway, Light & Power company, and organized to obtain more capital for the further development of the latter company, also represents General Gas & Electric company interests.

Mr. Barstow said: "The entire plan of the re-organization places the Rutland Railway, Light & Power company and the Western Vermont Light & Power company in a very strong position financially, providing practically unlimited capital at its disposal for the development of the properties."

"The Fair Haven property, under option to the Rutland Railway, Light & Power company, has been sold to the Western Vermont Light & Power company. This company will at once begin the enlargement of the Carvers Falls plant and the extension of transmission lines throughout the Rutland Railway, Light & Power company will continue developments at Clarendon, recently started."


