

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

The taxpayers of the city of Barre, Vermont, are hereby notified that the city taxes (including the state school tax, state highway tax, and county tax) for the year 1912 have been assessed by the city council of the city of Barre, and the tax bills delivered to the city treasurer for collection, to be paid to said treasurer at his office in the city hall, according to law, within thirty days, viz. on or before August 10, 1912. Any taxes remaining unpaid after the last mentioned date (August 10, 1912), the treasurer will issue his warrant against each delinquent person for the collection of such unpaid taxes, adding to each unpaid tax five per cent, and ten cents for warrant, which will be addressed and delivered to the constable of said city to be collected according to law. Office hours, from 8 a. m. to noon and from 1.30 to 5 p. m., Monday and Saturday evenings, 6.30 to 8 o'clock.


