

TRY TO BREAK THE DEADLOCK

Efforts in Buffalo To-day to Reopen Negotiations in Street Car Strike

UNION'S RECOGNITION CHIEF POINT AT ISSUE

General Strike of All Union Labor in the City Is Threatened

Buffalo, April 11.—With street cars running under military guard over only ten miles of the International Railway company's 300 miles of tracks and a general strike of all union labor in the city threatened, strong influences were brought to bear today upon the corporation and striking carmen to reach an agreement upon which the question of wages and hours can be arbitrated.

BULGARIA CLAIMING GREECE'S SALONICA

European Powers Are Said to Favor Giving the Demand as Compensation for Other Losses.

London, April 11.—Bulgaria is making formal claims to the possession of Salonika, now occupied by the Greek troops, according to an Exchange telegraph company dispatch from Belgrade, Serbia. The dispatch adds that Bulgaria is taking military measures to support her claim.

A Mountain Is Sliding into Culebra Cut at Panama

Washington, D. C., April 11.—The giant shoulder rock that for the past few years had prevented a mountain of earth from slipping into the Culebra cut on the Panama canal at last has given away, and, according to official reports received today, the slide moved into the canal a distance of eighty feet and is still traveling.

GIANT SHOULDER ROCK HAS GIVEN AWAY

Up to Jan. 31, last, the United States government had expended upon the canal \$281,702,630. By Oct. 1, 5,000,000 millions of cubic yards of material will have been removed by the steam shovels, the water will be turned on and the dredges will start on the removal of between 2,000,000 and 3,000,000 cubic yards of material.
