Controlling the Death Rate. The average expectation of life for man varies in different countries in direct proportion to the application of efficient principles of hygiene and sanitation. In India, for instance, where sanitation is low and the majority of the population live, like Kim, on "the ravelling of circumstances," the average duration of life is less than twenty-five years.

In Sweden and Denmark, where life is methodical and ideals are high, and the government takes up the ashphears regularly, a normal man may expect to live more than seventy years. In Massachusetts, which is the only one of our states to furnish us with reliable statistics, the average duration of life is forty-five years.

Wherever sanitary science is active the length of life is steadily increasing. In India it is stationary; in Europe it has doubled in the last 350 years; in New York it has doubled within the last half century.

Despite the many obstacles, it seems likely that when the next general census is taken the death rate of the metropolis will be drawn to thirteen per thousand. With such a rate, every person in the city may expect to live to be seventy years old. And most of them will say, "Isn't that old enough?"—Richard Barry in May Century.

Frank Trumbull, chairman of the board of directors of the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway company, has just issued in pamphlet form some observations made on a recent visit to Panama. These offer a view of which so little is heard as to be worthy of notice. The attitude of the ordinary visitor to the great undertaking is one of exaltation. Mr. Trumbull is enthusiastic, but thinks the work should be considered in its proper perspective, and to that end he suggests some comparisons.

The city of New York is spending for a new water supply half the cost of the Panama canal. That work is within reach of an easy motor trip from Manhattan. Two railroad companies alone have also invested in terminals in and about New York City half the cost of the canal. The railroads of the United States are spending more every year for improvements and new equipment than the expenditure at Panama in ten years.

As an engineering undertaking the Panama Canal is considerably more than General Dodge's building of the Union Pacific railroad in 1866, of the Pennsylvania railroad's tunnelling of the Hudson and the East rivers, or the construction of the subways of New York City. The men who do these things at home, Mr. Trumbull notes, always have hanging over them the burden of sustaining their credit, "a spectre unheard of in the canal zone. This same observer takes a crack at the commerce of the world phases of the new enterprise. He declares that Europe will still reach the Orient through the Suez, because that route passes the front door of 900,000,000 people, whereas ships via Panama will pass through uninterrupted wastes of waters. He might have added the coal question as supporting the same view. He says that the tonnage will not in the near future equal that which goes through the Suez canal, connecting Lake Superior and Lake Huron, or even the tonnage now hauled by his own railroad. And he concludes by asking "why are railroads expected to be self-supporting and the canal not expected to be?"

We can answer that question for him. Nothing that the government does is expected to be self-supporting. Whether performed by city, state, or nation, all sorts of hookkeeping devices are employed to conceal costs, and where even this does not satisfy, the patriotic appeal suffices to explain everything.—Boston Herald.
