



### BANKING BY MAIL

A New Plan Now in the Postal Savings System

ALLOWS LONG DISTANCE WITHDRAWALS

New and Important Pure Food Ruling from Washington

Washington, July 18.—"Banking by mail" is the latest innovation entered into by the government in connection with the postal savings system. Hereafter deposits may be made by mail and withdrawals likewise effected through the same agency. When the postal savings system was first put in operation, postmasters were forbidden to permit deposits by such persons as were not patrons of the postoffice in which they sought to bank. This was found to work a hardship on a certain class of would-be depositors, and Postmaster-General Burleson accordingly abrogated the rule. Postmasters throughout the country now are being advised of the change.

MEMORIAL AT LIGHTHOUSE POINT. It Will Mark an Interesting Event in the Revolution.

Acting Secretary of War Breckenridge has granted the Mary Clapp Wooster chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, permission to erect a memorial on the United States military reservation of Lighthouse point, near New Haven, Conn., to mark the scene of an interesting event in the Revolutionary war. The memorial consists of a large cannon and mount bearing a suitable inscription.

A NEW PURE FOOD RULING. Articles Imported for "Technical Purposes" Must Be Denatured. Wormy nutmegs and gelatine containing excessive amounts of arsenic, copper or zinc, which are imported for

"technical purposes," such as used in the arts, will have to be denatured in future, in accordance with an order issued yesterday by Secretary Houston, approved also by Secretary McAdoo. Some manufacturers, said Secretary Houston, have understood "technical purposes" to include the manufacture of food; and in some cases it has been found that importers have had that phrase placed on packages in order to obtain entry for their product. The new order requires that the label name the dangerous ingredients and have added: "Not for food or drug purposes." It provides further that the secretary of the treasury may release such products without denaturing "under such conditions as may preclude the possibility of their use as food products."

### CANOE UPSETS; TWO DROWN

Double Fatality Occurs at a Picnic of Colored People in Massachusetts.

Lowell, Mass., July 18.—Guy Coleman, 32, and Mary Turner, 26, colored, of Everett, were drowned in Lake Massacuppit at Lakeview yesterday afternoon, when their canoe overturned. They were attending a picnic of colored folk and a rowboat and several swimmers engaged in a long-distance swim were near, but the bodies did not come to the surface and were not recovered last night.

### NO CASE AGAINST COHALAN.

New York Legislative Committees Recommend Dismissal of Proceedings.

Albany, N. Y., July 18.—The Senate and assembly judiciary committees which have been investigating the charges against Supreme Court Justice Daniel F. Cohalan, reported to the legislature yesterday that none of the causes alleged for his removal has been proven and that a case for legislative action against the justice has not been established. The committee recommended that the proceedings be dismissed and that no further action be taken by the legislature.

### FORTY KILLED IN SULPHUR MINE

The Men Make a Frantic Rush to Escape When the Flames Break Out.

Palermo, Sicily, July 18.—A sulphur mine near Castell Termini caught fire yesterday, while many miners were at work. There was a terrible struggle to escape the deadly fumes, and it is estimated that 40 were killed. Loudon, who has been playing infield positions for the Detroit Tigers, is soon to be let go.

### EXPECT TO STAMP TRAGEDY UNSOLVED

Johns Freed and Police Are at Loss in the Alice Crispell Death Mystery.

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., July 18.—With Herbert Johns of this city discharged by Judge H. A. Fuller because there was not sufficient evidence to connect him with the death of Miss Crispell in Harvey's lake the night of July 4, the mystery will probably go down as an unsolved crime. Dist. Atty. John H. Higelow and the police admitted they have exhausted every clue and are now as much at sea as ever. They admit they have nothing tangible to work on since Johns is eliminated. Since the finding of the girl's body on the morning of July 7, the police have been working with a view of holding Johns to answer for the girl's mysterious death. That it was a murder, all believe, but there is no concrete information as to how Miss Crispell got into the lake. Many clues and suggestions have been offered the police—the latest the story of a spiritualist that the girl jumped into the lake from a boat into which she had been dragged by three men. Johns, liberated after nine days in jail, expressed the opinion the girl was murdered, but is at a loss to say how or by whom. However, the sweetheart of the mystery victim was more concerned with his own future than the cause of Miss Crispell's death, and said he will "give up the white lights and join a church."
