in mid-Atlantic there would probably have been a panic on board among the two thousand passengers, a panic such as the ship's officers might have been powerless to stay while engaged at the same time in attempting to check the progress of the flames. But at the ship's dock the officers and seamen were relieved of much of the work of fire fighting by the co-operation of the Hoboken fire department on land and water, so that they were enabled to turn their attention to getting the steerage passen-

gers safely ashore, the cabin passengers having already been taken off. Thus it will be seen that good fortune attended the outbreak of the flames on the Emperor yesterday, as everything conspired to prevent great sacrifice of life and tremendous financial loss. The occurrence emphasizes the importance of watchfulness to prevent an outbreak of fire and to begin immediate action once the flames are discovered, whether in mid-ocean or at the pier. The Emperor might have matched the Titanic in magnitude of catastrophe under conditions less favorable than they were yesterday.

"The Pink Lady" at Barre Opera House Next Tuesday.
