When discharged it was thought that he retreated to the woods in Worcester, from whence he came. But he lingered and propped his visit into the hands of the law yesterday afternoon. Officer Gamble was summoned to Burnham's meadow, where he found Childs asleep. He was taken to the station house, and this morning appeared ill. To-day marked the final touches of work on the paving job on North Main street, which has been under construction for the past few months. The new stretch of pavement commences at Granite street and extends northward on North Main street as far as Gunner brook at Blackwell street, bringing the linear measurement of paving in Barre close to a mile in length. The latest paving acquisition was started in the middle of July. The contract stated that work would have to be completed by October 1. The work was completed two weeks before expiration of the contract. With another week to allow the cement coating to set on the lower portion of the street, North Main street will be wide open for traffic. The work was done by the Daniel O'Connell Contracting company of Holyoke, Mass., extensive workers on paving jobs. This forenoon paving setters were engaged laying a strip of pavement at the corner of Elm and Washington streets, which was left in a rather bad condition some time ago when pipes were run underground.


