

Nowadays business follows electricity, and the place which is able to develop an excess of such power is certain to secure an increase of industries, providing the transportation facilities are reasonably adequate. Inasmuch as Rutland is well situated as to railroad transportation, it is reasonable to assume that Rutland county will get the industries in due season.

A NATIONAL GOLF TOURNAMENT FOR VERMONT.

The unanimous selection of the golf course at Manchester for the scene of the 1914 amateur golf championship of the United States will mean a boom to golfing interests in Vermont and, in addition, a boom to the summer hotel industry in Vermont. The choice is a marked compliment to the links maintained by the Ekwonok club of Manchester, as none but the courses which have reached the highest stage of development, coupled with natural advantages, are considered as possibilities. The annual tournament will bring a large number of contestants and a still larger number of golf enthusiasts who heretofore have gone to other sections of the country for several weeks' sojourn. Besides that, many will come to Vermont because of the advertising which the annual amateur championship brings. Thus the state is assured of one most favorable aid to a splendid summer's business.
