Joint legislative committee attention! A meeting of the joint legislative committee will be held in the granite cutters' rooms, Scamplin block, Wednesday evening, Jan. 14, at 7 p. m. Business important. James Crajekbank, chairman; Alex. Ironside, secretary.

The postoffice department is advertising for bids to carry the mail between the new federal building and the Central Vermont station. Since the resignation of Charles Sharkey, who recently went to Massachusetts to reside, the mail has been carried by John Plouff. The latter has not been a regular mail carrier, although it is understood that he will consider the position.

Posters have been distributed through the city announcing the opening ice races of the Capital City Driving club of Montpelier. The races will be held on Wednesday afternoon, January 21, providing weather conditions are suitable. In event of poor weather the races will be held the next favorable day. The races will number four, the green race, the trotting race and the 2:25 and the 2:18 races. Several local people will probably send entries for the races.

For the first time in several years, ice men employed by Ward & Sons have been compelled to cease work on account of cold weather. Yesterday Mayor Ward's gang of 50 sawyers and teamsters went to Peck's pond on the "hill" to harvest the ice there. But the wind swept the ice with such force that the men decided to let the harvesting alone until warmer weather. Ice at Peck's pond has attained a thickness of 17 inches. On the South Barre mill pond, where the first crop was harvested only a week ago, ice measuring 8 inches has already formed. If the cold snap continues a few days longer, the ice men will be ready to return to the mill pond to resume operations as soon as the crop on Peck's pond is cut.

Sometime within the month, a hearing will be held in the council chamber at city hall on the proposal to convert the land at Gospel village into a public park and playground, as requested in a petition presented to the council late in the fall. At the regular meeting of the aldermen last night, the matter was discussed informally and it was decided to designate a day when the aldermanic committee of the whole shall go to Gospel village and look into the situation. Mayor Ward has expressed a desire to hold a hearing in the near future. The petitioners, numbering some 150, have asked that the city condemn the land and then utilize it for the purpose already named. They have asked for a hearing, but for some reason the matter was held for several weeks.
