Although quantities of wood are being drawn in Townshend, it is said the price has never been so high in that locality as this winter.

A special town meeting is to be held in Hartland, Jan. 31, to see if the legal voters will accept a gift of \$10,000 to build a new town hall, the town to furnish the site and to do the grading and maintain the said hall.

Mrs. Ann Clune Clark, who had the distinction of being the oldest person in Benson, died at her home Saturday, Jan. 17. She was born in Ireland 97 years ago and had lived in Benson over 50 years. She was the widow of Thomas Clark, who lived to be nearly 90.

A committee of Vergennes citizens, named to report on a filtration plant for that city, made their report at a city meeting recently. It provides not only for a filtration plant but also an electric plant to furnish power for the filtration plant and lights for the city, at a cost of \$47,000.

Miss Sophie Taboret has been appointed a special police by Mayor Burke of Burlington and she has begun her duties of patrolling Church street at night. Her special duties will be to keep watch of young girls and would-be masqueraders who follow them up. She will dress inconspicuously and will be on duty principally in the evening.

CLAIM EXTRAVAGANCE.

Some Citizens of Shelburne Complain to State Board of Health.

Burlington, Jan. 24.—The state board of health during their stay here yesterday conducted a hearing on complaints of alleged over-expense charged to the town of Shelburne by Health Officer Dr. W. H. Ranks in the performance of his duties.

The selectmen of the town alleged that Dr. Ranks had charged for services which he had not rendered.

It appeared at the hearing that considerable feeling had been occasioned in the town over some of the transactions which resulted finally in the matter being brought before the board.

The board reserved decision and will further consider the evidence. Health officers in the state are appointed by the state board upon approval of the selectmen of a town.

NORTH WALPOLE HOUSE BURNED.

Occupants Were Driven Out at Early Hour in Morning.

Bellows Falls, Jan. 24.—The dwelling house of Peter Stack at 21 Elm street, North Walpole, was destroyed by fire with all its contents at 3 o'clock yesterday morning. The family, including four children, had only time to get out in their night clothes, with the thermometer registering 23 degrees below zero.

The house was located near the log piles of the International Paper Co., and the fire department devoted its energies to preventing the hearing from communicating to the logs as nothing could be done to save any part of the building or contents. The log piles contain from 15,000,000 to 20,000,000 feet of lumber.

It is apparent that the fire started around the chimney, and it was well under way when discovered. The loss is about \$1,000. Mr. Stack bought the dwelling of Walter Parker two years ago.

BABY CHOKED TO DEATH.

Piece of Food Lodged in Its Throat—Was 21 Months Old.

Rutland, Jan. 24.—Rose, 21 months old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter St. Armand of West Rutland, choked to death accidentally Thursday afternoon at the parents' home.

The baby had just eaten dinner and its mother sat it on the floor. Almost immediately it began to choke violently and it is thought that some potato which it consumed, got into its windpipe. The child died before a physician could be secured.

EDDY BANKRUPT TRUSTEES.

Were Elected by Creditors at Meeting in Montpelier.

Fifty creditors of C. F. Eddy, the bankrupt creamery operator, met yesterday at the Montpelier city hall, where an examination of the bankrupt was held throughout the day, and will be resumed again Wednesday, Feb. 4.

The creditors elected a board of three trustees, the two assignees, O. E. Luce of Stowe and C. C. Graves of Waterbury, and Attorney Fred B. Thomas of Montpelier, to represent the creditors in this vicinity, and their joint bond was fixed at \$3,000 and all books and accounts ordered turned over to them.

During the examination of Mr. Eddy, City Attorney B. E. Bailey and Attorney F. B. Thomas represented Montpelier and vicinity, Attorney B. M. Morris of Morrisville represented creditors from all over the state and several corporations in New Hampshire, about 200 in all; G. W. Morse of Waterbury represented creditors from Waterbury and Waitfield and F. G. Fleetwood of Morrisville was counsel for Mr. Eddy.

Referee Theriault opened up the examination, bringing out the identity of Mr. Eddy, his residence in Stowe for the past 14 years, that it was his signature on the schedule filed and that the list of assets and liabilities was complete and correct.

At this point City Attorney B. E. Bailey took up the examination and went over the accounts of the bankrupt. He found that all those owed for personal services had been paid, except two. Mr. Eddy had not brought all his books and accounts with him and was unable to give many of the dates and accounts asked for, and it was for this reason that another meeting was called for Feb. 4, when the rest might be gone over.

Mr. Eddy testified that he was conducting seven creameries in Vermont and had half interest in one in New York at the time of his assignment. The one in New York he sold to his partner, T. B. Grant of New York, for two checks for \$500 each. He went to Boston before the assignment and sold this because a live creamery is worth something while a dead one is not, he said.

He asked \$2,000 for the Montpelier creamery and \$2,000 for another, but got \$6,400 for both. He said he didn't get as much as he would if he had had more time, but got more than could have been secured had the bankruptcy occurred first. He was also questioned as to his book accounts and said he had accounts in banks in Montpelier and Morrisville but did not have his bank books with him.
