HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

Twenty patients were admitted to the Rutland hospital last week and 15 were discharged. There are now 23 patients in the institution.

Rev. A. E. Martin, pastor of the Congregational church in Wilmington, has accepted a call to the pastorate of the Congregational church in Turners Falls, Mass.

So many logs have been delivered at Brattleboro mills that it has been necessary to refuse to accept more in some cases. The S. A. Smith Manufacturing company has over 1,000,000 feet in its yard.

Homer C. Bristol, who died in Brooklyn, N. Y., Thursday evening at the age of 43, was principal of Vermont academy at Saxton River for three years prior to 1897, when he left Vermont to engage in educational work in Brooklyn. At the time of his death, he was president of the principals' association of New York City.

Nathan D. Mann of Wilmington for 40 years a director of the Wilmington bank, is 82 years of age and during his long service 22 of his fellow directors have died. The annual bank meeting was last Tuesday, and for the first time in the 40 years Mr. Mann was unable to attend, being confined to his home by rheumatism.

Miss Maude Sparks and Miss Helen Ellis came to Barre, Vermont, with the old on January 15 while walking to the former's home in Middlebury. In order to shorten the distance the young ladies started to cross the fields, but the deep snow retarded their progress and in consequence Miss Ellis received several frozen toes, while Miss Sparks is threatened with pneumonia.

The loss by fire in Burlington in 1913 was \$12,000, the largest for some years. It was also a record for alarms, the department responding to 184. Most of the loss was confined to four fires, that at the Shepard & Morse Lumber company, the G. S. Blodgett company, the Horatio Hickock company and the Perfection Overgreaser company and grist-mill property. The loss was practically covered by insurance.

J. W. Hovey of East Hardwick will be 81 years old on the morning of May 6 next. During the present winter he went into the woods on the Hovey home place, cut down several trees and hauled them to the house. There, with a handsaw, he cut the logs into stove length and then split the wood into stove wood. Friends of Mr. Hovey believe that he has few equals as a wood cutter in the 81-year-old class in Vermont. Mr. Hovey is still rugged and will cut more wood.

Alexander Tuscany and L. J. Peterson of St. Albans have been granted a patent on a stanchion-retainer. The objects of the invention are to provide that when the keeper of the stanchion is in an open position the device will latch the pivoted stanchion against horizontal swinging movement, the construction being such that when the keeper is swung inwardly to a locked position the stanchion will be released automatically for such movement; and also to hold the keeper firmly in its latched position. About 300 of the devices are already in use in Franklin county. Mr. Tuscany is a foreman in the Central Vermont foundry and Mr. Peterson is a blacksmith.

Burlington police commissioners have not signed the commission of Sophia Taboret, who has been made a special policeman by Mayor Hovey. Her objections to the appointment have come to the attention of the commissioners and although they may not prevail against the appointment, they will be given due consideration by the board. A meeting was held on the subject Saturday night and another will be held early this week before the commissioners decide on whether they will attach their signatures to the qualifying document.

RANDOLPH VILLAGE STIRRED BY R. O. LEWIS Preaching of Evangelist Causes Much Discussion Among the Good Citizens of the Place.

The conservative village of Randolph has been greatly agitated in the last three weeks by the presence and preaching of an evangelist and his methods have been generally discussed on the street, in the business place, lecture hall and private residence. The Barre class of the Federated church, in the month of December, voted to invite R. O. Lewis, an evangelist of the Baptist denomination from the state of New York, to come and labor with them early in the new year. Mr. Lewis, who is a brother of Supt. H. W. Lewis, accepted the invitation and fixed Jan. 4 as the time for the beginning of his work here. Meanwhile the Barre class decided to assume the expense of heating and lighting the Baptist church, a piano was procured and moved into the auditorium for their use and some general repairs on the furnace made, and other arrangements made by which the room could be made comfortable and the strangers made welcome. At the appointed time Mr. Lewis arrived, accompanied by Misses Edna L. and Olive P. Aylesworth, the first of whom is a talented pianist and a good soprano singer, and the last, Miss Olive, is possessed of a rich contralto voice, and sings with a power and spirit which appeals to all. Mr. Lewis is also a singer with ability much above the average and a director of music who can drill a chorus in a thorough manner. His work here began Sunday evening, Jan. 4, and here he was assisted by a chorus of about 50 voices which has increased to nearly 100 at the present time. His method of introducing himself before his first audience was original, and unlike any other, and his methods are a constant surprise. Mr. Lewis is a good speaker, well versed in the Bible and many of his illustrations are wonderful in their power and effect. The easy going Christian are very pronounced, but he impresses the listener with his earnestness and sincerity. Each evening, except Saturday, a meeting has been held and for the most part they have been well attended, and there have been about 100 children and people of mature age who have expressed their determination to lead a Christian life, while many of those formerly known as Christians have reconverted themselves. The spirit of criticism has been busy at work, but by nearly all Mr. Lewis' sincerity is acknowledged, although his methods do not appeal to everybody.

On Sunday morning he gave a good sermon before a large audience, and a meeting to women only was attended by about 75 in the afternoon. Mr. Lewis' advertisement in the local paper brought many out to church on Sunday evening and there were in the audience 190 persons and the choir numbered about 40. The service opened with the usual song service, followed by about 50 short prayers led by Edward Smithers. The prayer lesson followed, which consisted of a favorite verse in the Bible, given by many all over the auditorium. The grand male quartet were present and gave a selection, "Remember Now Thy Creator," and this was followed by testimonies given by many. Mr. Lewis then announced a duet which he sang with Miss Aylesworth, entitled "Precious Name." This brought him up to his subject, which he said he announced very reluctantly, but from obedience to duty. This he announced, "Hell; Is There a Hell, If So, Where, and How Long?" He said that with the study of the word the spirit never makes a mistake, there being only one right way, although a wrong one may sometimes appear. Sometimes we get our own will against what the word reveals. He then asked his audience, "How many will lift their hand and say, We believe the word of God from Genesis to Revelation inspired of God," and followed with: "The people who do not believe the word of God are the ones who have never studied it much, if at all. Ingersoll, Tom Paine and other noted infidels had no faith in the word of God to soothe the dead, and the greatest scholars have been helpless to meet death calmly or to give anything in exchange for the faith in the Bible. Is there a hell? If there is hell there is white, if there is hell there is a devil, if there is a heaven there is a hell. Fifty-three times hell is spoken in the Bible. Every ash pile, every garbage pile, every graveyard, proves there is a hell, a separation. The jails, the penitentiaries, prove this and for the same reason, God has a hell. The first reason why I believe in hell is because we see men on every side who choose a hell on earth, those living in a community deliberately choosing a hell on earth.
