HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

A large meteor was seen in Brattleboro Tuesday evening, appearing like a ball of fire at least six inches in diameter, from which blazing fragments broke off and left a long trail of light behind.

Harry Noyes, formerly of Rutland, who escaped recently from the Vermont Industrial school at Vergennes, where he was an inmate, was recaptured at St. Albans and was returned Thursday to the institution.

Charles W. Stewart, aged 71, for many years a resident of Brattleboro, died Wednesday after a three years' illness. Mr. Stewart was a drummer boy for nine months in the Civil war and in 1864 entered the employ of the Estey Organ company, where he continued for 30 years. Failing health compelled him to drop active business life about ten years ago.

About a quart of blood was transfused Friday from an artery of Edwin F. Lindsey into the veins of Frank W. Gipson, who was suffering from anemia at the Brattleboro hospital. Mr. Gipson's condition showed immediate improvement and Mr. Lindsey, although weak, was able to be about the hospital that evening and enjoy a smoke.

Charles E. Bliss, an old-time telegraph operator and former postmaster at Brailford, Me., died last week after a brief illness. He was born in Bradford, Vt., July 22, 1833. Mr. Bliss was one of the first operators to read by sound. In his early days he was employed in Boston.

UNION SUPTS. ORGANIZE.

Nine union school superintendents of the upper Winoochi valley met in the city hall at Montpelier yesterday and formed an organization, electing officers and having a discussion on school matters in general. It was also decided to meet again in Montpelier April 10.

In the forenoon the superintendents visited schools and at noon dinner was served to them in the domestic science rooms in the basement of the Kellogg-Hubbard library by the girls in the domestic science class. Early in the afternoon further visits to schools were made and at 4 o'clock the men came together for a business session. These officers of the new organization were elected: President, S. C. Hutchinson of Montpelier; vice-president, George J. Seager of Barre Town; secretary, E. M. Roscoe of Barre City.

The advisability of conducting a local teachers' convention was discussed, the formation of potato and corn clubs and the use of stereopticons in school work. For the first meeting, and one which was held primarily for organization purposes, it proved a great success. Besides the names named as officers there were present B. C. Douglass of Waitsfield, J. S. Tibbetts of Marshfield, Norman Frost of Waterbury, C. D. Howes of Morrisville, L. D. Smith of Williamstown and J. A. Hunter of Northfield.

ALMOST FROZEN TO DEATH.

Fred Guyette Found Unconscious in Highway in Moretown.

Fred Guyette was found in the road in Moretown yesterday morning in an unconscious condition and nearly frozen to death. Lewis Shaneski, a farmer employed by George Hastings of Waitsfield, was on his way to Montpelier about 6 o'clock yesterday morning, when he saw the body of a man in the road. Investigation showed the man to be overcome by the cold, and Mr. Shaneski hurried him to the home of H. O. Ward, nearby, where restoratives were applied and consciousness restored.

Little is known of Mr. Guyette except that he was formerly a resident of Middlebury. He is unable to account for his condition or to tell how long he had been lying in the highway.

\$500,000 IN TAXES COMING.

Next Week a Big One in State Treasurer's Office.

The sum of \$500,000 in taxes is due the state of Vermont next week, when \$300,000 will come from banks and corporations doing a banking business, \$150,000 from insurance companies; \$25,000 from telephone companies and approximately \$30,000 from the annual license tax. Checks from various companies have already begun to pour into the office.

This is the last time the telephone companies will pay taxes based on their gross income and under the new law must pay hereafter a tax fixed on the basis of an appraisal of the value of their properties and rights, which will almost double the amounts. The state has appealed from the first appraisal made and a hearing before the board of appeals is to be held next Thursday morning in the State House.

A Joke on New York.

No line of legislative activity in this and other states more readily wins favor than the protection of some class of public employes from the cruel hand of a superior officer or other manifestation of public authority. Such bills are constantly urged on Beacon Hill, and with great plausibility. The New York World has now discovered that if the notorious Becker is acquitted on his second trial because of "the restriction placed upon evidence by the court of appeals," he will have to be returned to his place on the police force, with his old rank of lieutenant, and his salary will have to be paid from the time of his indictment for murder. Under the present laws of New York, the instant Becker is free from the criminal courts his reinstatement follows automatically. And yet the World declares it is "commonly known" that Becker was "a grafter and a crook," and that he "levied his filthy tribute upon vice and crime." But the law does not permit the police commissioner to take advantage of any personal knowledge of a man's unfitness, instead the law gives the officer a vested interest in his job. Sometimes this works badly. Here is such a case. Let Beacon Hill take notice.—Boston Herald.


