# FALL DEMANDS INTERVENTION

### Says United States Must Act in the Mexican Situation

### 100 OUTRAGES IN THREE YEARS

### Senator Shively Defends the Course of the Administration

Washington D. C., March 10.—The lid of secrecy regarding Mexico was lifted in the Senate yesterday by Senator Fall, Republican of New Mexico, who urged armed intervention for the protection of Americans in the stricken republic. The galleries were crowded.

Senator Shively of Indiana spoke for the administration, expressing regret that the subject had been discussed in an open session and averring that no adequate suggestions had been offered to settle the difficulty.

Senator Fall in a lengthy narration of outrages against Americans in Mexico assailed the policy of the administration. He declared President Wilson knew nothing about real conditions and has been mistaken in every act toward Mexico.

Emphasizing the danger of war with a great foreign power unless something should speedily be done, Senator Fall referred to the comments in the German press over the Benton killing, declaring: "When the German press says that should a German citizen be murdered in Mexico, Germany would not acquiesce like England, then I say there is imminent danger of conflict between this country and a country with which we should always be at peace."

Senator Shively said no one doubts what intervention means. The government is working out a solution that will not involve war.

Specific charges that more than 100 Americans and other foreigners have been killed, murdered or outraged during the last three years of revolution in Mexico, were laid before the Senate by Senator Fall in the course of his speech, in which he urged armed intervention, not for war, but for protection of non-combatants—and assailed the administration's policy. Senator Fall's list gave names, dates and circumstances, and was gathered from his own sources. The Benton, Vergara and Bauch killings and the death of the 15 Americans in the Cumber tunnel disaster, are included in those since March 4, 1913. Acting Chairman Shively of the foreign relations committee, armed with material from the White House and the state department, was ready to give the administration's view, but the prospect was that all yesterday's session would be taken up with Mr. Fall's speech. Secretary Bryan, when he heard of Senator Fall's charges, said he would make no statement until he had read all of the senator's speech and would, for the present, leave the administration's defense to senators.

"With the solemn declaration that we do not war upon the Mexican nation or people," said Senator Fall, "that it is not our purpose to acquire territory, upset their laws or overturn their constitution, and an invitation to the masses of the Mexican people to co-operate with us; we should immediately direct the use of the land and naval forces of this government for the protection of our citizens and other foreigners in Mexico and lend their assistance to the restoration of order and maintenance of peace in that unhappy country. I might cite authority after authority and present precedent upon precedent as justification under international law for such action, but I will only read from the message of the martyred McKinley with only the suggestion that we insert the name 'Mexico' in lieu of that of Cuba or Spain."

Mr. Fall read a portion of President McKinley's famous war message and then referred to President Wilson's refusal last autumn to transmit information relative to Mexico to the Senate, on the ground that it was incompatible with the public interest.

"Abraham Lincoln thought it not incompatible with the public interests to fully inform the Senate concerning communications between this government and that of France," said he. "Grover Cleveland thought it not incompatible with the public interests to forward to this body all papers and correspondence concerning the arrest, death, etc., of various Americans in Cuba as will be seen by reference to his special messages."

Senator Fall, picturing conditions in Mexico, included a vivid statement he had received yesterday from Emeterio de la Garza, who came to Washington last year in the interest of the Huerta government. From de la Garza's letter Senator Fall read:

"Those who now rule in Mexico, both at the Aztec capital and that of the revolution are by their bloody deeds a legion of intoxicated demons who are courting fat failure."

A large portion of the letter which followed was a detailed attack on President Wilson's Mexican policy.

"The government and the revolution, both of them, are unhealthy and have gone mad, as their aim is none other than to thwart civilization and re-establish barbarism," the senator read from the letter.

Mr. Fall called up a resolution introduced last summer but unacted upon, reaffirming a plank in the Democratic platform of 1912 as follows:

"The constitutional rights of American citizens should protect them on our borders and go with them throughout the world, and every American citizen residing or having property in any foreign country is entitled to and must be given the full protection of the United States government, both for himself and his property."

He quoted opinions of international law to justify intervention, not for war, but for protection, and also cited numerous instances of such intervention on the part of this government in other countries.

"Mr. President," he demanded, "is not our Monroe doctrine, our American doctrine and our safety as a nation in jeopardy now?"

Senator Fall declared the United States had "politically intervened" in

# WHAT ULSTER WILL BE GIVEN

### How It Is Proposed to Meet Home Rule Objections

### PREMIER ASQUITH PRESENTS PLAN

### Is Received Coldly by the Unionists and Law En-ters Quick Protest

London, March 10.—Premier Asquith yesterday laid before the house of commons his proposed concessions to Ulster in regard to its position under the home rule bill.

The announcement, which had been so long and anxiously awaited, was to the effect that before the bill became operative a poll should be taken of the parliamentary electors of each county to decide whether there should be an exclusion of the Ulster counties from the provisions of the bill for a period of six years from the first meeting of the new Irish parliament.

If the majority of the voters was in favor of the scheme the county would automatically be excluded from the prescribed period.

Before an attendance even bigger than that which listened to the introduction of the Irish home rule bill, Premier Asquith began his statement shortly before 4 o'clock. He prefaced his speech with the declaration that the government made these suggestions yesterday not because it was running away from the original bill, but merely to allow the bill to start with the greatest prospect of success.

While there was a possibility of acute dissatisfaction and civil strife in Ulster, said the premier, yet, if the bill should be shipwrecked or postponed, the outlook was equally formidable.

Supporters of the bill were as convinced yesterday as ever they had been of the soundness of its principles and machinery, continued the premier. He said they regarded it as a sincere and considerate attempt to place the Irish government on a solid foundation, without "injustice or hardship to any class."

He informed the house that the negotiations for a compromise last autumn had failed to result even in an approach to an agreement, but had made all realize more than ever the difficulties of the situation. To meet Ulster's difficulties, they had tried to devise home rule within home rule, but that proposition did not commend itself either to the Nationalists or the Unionists in Ireland.

Summarized the compromise offered by Premier Asquith is that the four Protestant counties in the province of Ulster, namely, Antrim, Armagh, Londonderry and Down, shall retain for six years their old standing in the United Kingdom outside the jurisdiction of the Dublin government. The nine counties of Ulster are to be allowed each to hold a separate referendum as to whether they will accept home rule and the view generally expressed in parliament is that there can be no mould of the result.

The plan met with a cool reception from the unionists.

Andrew Bonar Law immediately objected to a six year limit and demanded the dissolution of imperial parliament on the question.

John Redmond declared the Nationalists would agree to the terms to make peace.

Children Wanted Fresh Air. An interesting experiment of the "Open-air Crusade," tried upon normal children in one of the public schools, was conducted by the principal of the Graham school of Chicago. After noting the great success of the Elizabeth McCormick school for diseased children, he determined to find out what plenty of fresh air would do for the children in his building. Accordingly, two rooms were used for the open-air classes. At the outset there was difficulty in gaining the co-operation of parents, as it was zero weather. After a term's trial, so satisfactory was the result upon the pupils, both physically and mentally, that the parents themselves began to ask for more fresh-air classes. The school year closed with seven open rooms. With the beginning of a new year, so popular had fresh-air schoolrooms become that twenty cold rooms were opened for public instruction.—Suburban Life—The Countryside Magazine.
