HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

The operating revenues of the Rutland railroad for January were \$291,309.56, and the operating expenses \$219,007.07, giving a net operating revenue of \$72,302.49.

The docket of the March term of Rutland county court, which opened today, contains 65 cases. There are 41 divorce cases. The criminal docket is made up of 27 cases.

H. B. Whittier, Rutland city weigher, announces in his annual report that there were 2,233 articles weighed on the scales in 1913. The fees to the city amounted to \$119.65.

At the annual town meeting in Ludlow the selectmen were instructed to sell the town farm and personal property thereon at public or private sale, as they shall deem best.

Saturday morning A. I. Cobb of Wardsboro pleaded guilty to a single sale of liquor and was fined \$300 and costs of about \$20, which he paid. He also paid the costs of the search and seizure proceedings, which amounted to about \$20 more.

William B. Gilpin of Westfield tendered to Gov. Allen M. Fletcher his resignation as assistant judge of the Orleans county court, and Elisha Lane of Newport was appointed to fill the vacancy. Judge Gilpin was led to resign by personal reasons.

A deer that was caught in the ice on the river in Springfield was attacked by a bull dog last Friday morning just as an electric car came along and the passengers, assisted by the train crew, stoned the dog away from the deer, which was a large doe. The doe freed herself from the ice and escaped.

A dog belonging to E. L. Wheeler of Whitingham was missing several days last week, but was finally found in the schoolhouse, where he accidentally was locked in by the janitor the day after school closed. He had been there nine days without food or water. Except for being very thirsty, the dog seemed as well as ever.

On account of the ill health of his wife, W. H. Ledoux, for two years superintendent of the Orchard farm of the Eastern Fruit & Nut Orchard Co. in Grand Isle, has resigned his position and April 1 will return to his market garden farm in South Burlington. The management of the Orchard company has secured the services of N. W. Van Clave of Spokane, Wash., for two years.

KICKED TO DEATH BY A HORSE

Harry W. Chase, Lumber Dealer, Victim in Southern Vermont—He Was Struck in the Head.

Windsor, March 10.—Harry W. Chase, senior member of the firm of Chase & Carpenter of Providence, R. I., died at one o'clock yesterday afternoon at the Claremont hospital from injuries sustained when he was kicked in the head by a horse at his camp on Ascutney mountain yesterday morning.

Mr. Chase's right eye was driven out of his head and his skull crushed by the impact of the hoof of the animal which struck him with terrible force on the temple as he reached down to unhitch a trace.

Drs. McKewen and Miner who were hastily called to the camp by friends of the victim ordered his removal to the hospital.

Mr. Chase was 50 years old. He had been superintending the lumber operations of his firm in this vicinity during the past year. He was married and lived at Pawtucket, R. I.
