The Boston Transcript, which speaks of the "Fordmaniac of Vermont who chugs lazily in the geographical center of the road for a dozen miles of highway" is laboring under a false impression—the "Fordmaniac" is no more leisurely than the curvature of most of the roads in Vermont demands. Windsor. Idleness is to-day, as always, one of the surest breeders of crime and criminals, and if one were able to judge of the manner of living of these two youths he would say that time had been allowed to hang far too heavily on their hands. They were old enough, presumably, to have left school and to have become, engaged in some serious occupation in order to give them a right start in life; yet they seem to have drifted around, from city dump to second-hand stores and where else does not appear, to acquire the habit of idleness and to develop all other habits which go with idleness, finally to round up in the court of justice on the charge of slaying one of their fellow-men. It is a particularly sad state of affairs and one which society should do its utmost to straighten out. This can best be done by the acceptance of pleas of guilty of the lesser homicide crime and then by placing the youths in an institution where the restraining influence of the law can be exerted to the utmost. In passing sentence on the two respondents the judge is likely to urge that the corrective and formative force of organized society in its best form be allowed to have full sway in guiding the conduct of the two unfortunates. That done, one can only hope that the youths will respond to the efforts in their behalf, while showing appreciation of the leniency and kindness of the law toward them.


