WOODSTOCK VOTERS DISPUTED.

Over the Tax Rate to Be Imposed During the Present Year.

Woodstock, March 30.—A largely attended special town meeting Saturday voted to rescind the vote passed at the annual meeting March 9 to raise a tax of \$2 on grand list. There has been much feeling over the tax question and the town has been freely circulated by opponents and supporters of the \$2 tax. The gathering was somewhat helligerent and vociferous. There was some question as to the legality of the vote in the Berlin meeting, as a number of women voted on the general appropriation for current expenses, which included school

expenses, but this was disposed of by Attorney-General Brown, who said it was legal inasmuch as the number of votes cast by women would not have affected the result.
After much speechmaking the meeting Saturday rescinded the former vote and reduced the tax to \$1.50. This was done notwithstanding a statement from the attorney-general, which was read by Moderator J. S. Eaton, that such action was illegal. A motion to instruct the selectmen to submit the question to supreme court was also howled down. There is a quite general opinion that Saturday's vote was ill-considered and likely to involve the town in legal difficulties if any taxpayer protests and the attorney-general's opinion is supported by the supreme court.
