HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

An apple blossom was picked in Northfield the other day in a meadow where there was still considerable snow.

As the result of an injury received a short time ago from a mass of frozen sawdust, John Brennan of Orleans was obliged to have a limb amputated last Wednesday.

The little child of Fred Parker of West Monkton recently got hold of a bottle of iodine and drank some and has a very badly blistered mouth and throat. It is expected the dose will not prove fatal.

The prospect of band concerts on the park in Bristol the coming summer is at present far from cheering. The voters refused at town meeting to aid the band and the members of the band are divided on the questions of reorganizing. As soon as this question is decided steps will be taken to secure funds for concerts.

After being lost a year a valuable racoon coat belonging to Mrs. J. F. Washburn of Putney has been found. The coat was discovered the other day at the home of J. W. Warrano. The garment was given up without any proceedings and it was claimed that a man named Bruno, now in Italy, gave it to them.

A singular formation of snow occurred at the summer residence of Dr. C. E. Bruce in Townshend. As the snow loosened from the slate roof it slid over the roof of the piazza, the outer crust being hard enough to hold it firmly together when the lower edge struck the ground, thus forming a curtain like a rolling door fully 12 feet high the entire length of the piazza. It remained in that position several days.

The Bristol water system has reached a stage where it is self-sustaining. The receipts for the six months ending Dec. 1, 1913, were \$1,980.47. This would give, counting the increase for the present six months at \$100, a total for the year of nearly \$3,900. The bonds, \$51,000, will take \$2,400 of this for interest, leaving \$900 to pay running expenses of the system.

H. M. Carpenter, Springfield's oldest citizen, is celebrating his 91st birthday to-day at the home of his granddaughter, Mrs. F. C. LaFontaine, where he has made his home for several years. Mr. Carpenter is in quite good health and able to be about the house each day. He was blacksmith by trade and worked for many years at the Vermont Novelty Works, a former local manufacturing plant, and is a veteran of the Civil war, having been a member of Company F, fourth regiment, Vermont volunteers.

United States Civil Service Examination for Rural Carrier.

At Barre, Bradford, Randolph and Stratford, Vt., for Orange county, Saturday, April 23, 1914.

The United States civil service commission announces an open competitive examination on the date and at the places named above, as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill vacancies in the position of rural carrier in East Corinth and Stratford, Vt., and other vacancies as they may occur on rural routes at postoffices in the above-named county, unless it is found to be in the interest of the service to fill any vacancy by reinstatement, transfer, or promotion. The compensation of a rural carrier is based upon the length of the route. Salaries range from \$184 to \$1,100 per year.

Age 18 to 35, on the date of the examination. The maximum age is waived in cases of persons honorably discharged from the United States military or naval service.

An applicant must have his actual domicile in the territory supplied by a postoffice in the county for which the examination is announced. The examination is open to all male citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

FROM FARMER TO CONSUMER.

Parcel Post to be Utilized Throughout New England.

The postmaster of Boston has been directed to obtain a list of all farmers who desire to be placed in direct touch with consumers of farm products in order that the facilities of the parcel post may be extended as rapidly as possible, as a medium by means of which the producer may deal directly with the consumer through the mails.

The plan of the postmaster general is to have the postmaster of Boston secure names of farmers who desire to send their product by parcel post, prepare printed lists of these names and send these lists to consumers who desire to order direct from the farmers.

These lists will show the kinds of product each farmer desires to sell, under three heads—butter, eggs and general produce.

In discussing this plan of the postoffice department, the first assistant postmaster general has issued the following statement: "By the use of the lists the city consumer will be able to get in touch with a farmer who will fill his weekly order for butter and eggs and other farm products. The consumer will receive the produce fresh from the country and the personal relationship established will no doubt tend to improve the quality. The farmer will be relieved of carrying his produce to market, as the rural carrier will make daily collections at the farmer's own door of these retail shipments to city consumers."

"The point has been raised," said Mr. Roper, "that difficulty will be experienced in the return of hampers and other containers. This problem does not appear to me as difficult of solution. The farmer may use inexpensive hampers whose value would not warrant their return, or he may use the higher grade hampers for which he may include an additional charge to be credited to the consumer upon the return of the hamper by parcel post."

"The postmaster general has the firm conviction that this plan is the one thing necessary to enable the people of this country to enjoy the potential benefits of the parcel post. No one has ever questioned the possibility of reducing the cost of living by establishing direct relations between the ultimate consumer and the original producer."

"A complete means for such direct transportation was provided for the first time by the establishment of the domestic parcel post, but there has been lacking an agency by means of which the individual producer could get in touch with the individual consumer. The postmaster general's plan is designated to provide this agency for the most economical distribution of those products which are consumed in the form and condition in which they are produced."

Farmers who desire to have their names included in the lists to be furnished to consumers, are requested to write to the postmaster at Boston, Mass., stating the kind of produce they have for sale, either butter, eggs, or general produce, or all three.

Notice to Owners and Keepers

All dogs within the city four weeks old and over on the first day of April, next, must be licensed on or before that date, in accordance with the provisions of act 226 of the acts of the general assembly of 1912 and section 4, chapter 43, of the ordinances of the city of Barre. Fees if licensed by April 1, 1914:

Females \$3.00, Males and spayed females 2.00. If licensed after April 1 and before May 15, 1914:

Males and spayed females \$3.00, Females and spayed females 5.00. After May 15, 1914, all unlicensed dogs will be shot and the owners subjected to a fine of \$20.00.
