the people," meaning the mob in this case.

The misfortune which came to the town of Milton Tuesday through visitation by fire might have been averted in part, it would seem from the reports, if the community had been better supplied with fire fighting equipment; but, as it is, the town has lost a considerable share of its grand list because of the destruction of two business structures and contents and the partial damage to a third structure. And that which makes the blow more serious is the belief that one at least of the buildings will not be replaced. These little Vermont towns are saddled each year with direct loss through wiping out of industries and stores and with indirect loss through decreased grand list and lessened receipts from taxation, so that it would appear to be economy to provide reasonable fire protection in the first place. The element of good luck has been reckoned on too much in a large number of communities in Vermont.

**THE SUGAR HARVEST SEASON.**

The Vermont farmer who is not taking advantage of this April maple sugar making season is losing a tremendous boost in the financial summary of his year. Nature promises to be very kindly to the farmer who took occasion to be prepared and is letting loose the sap of the maple in unusual quantity—and quality, too, if one were to judge by the finished product that has been placed on the market. The receipts from a good sugar season swell the total income of the Vermont farm to a marked degree and put the farmer a long way ahead on the road to complete independence, speaking financially. Moreover, much of the receipts comes from outside the borders of the state, inasmuch as the sugar finds a big market in the far corners of the United States, and the state is enriched to that extent. That is new money to Vermont and otherwise would never have found its way into Vermont. Therefore, it is to be hoped that the farmers will bend every energy to produce a bumper crop of maple sugar and syrup of the best quality. They need not worry about the big markets although the local markets may be glutted temporarily with the product. They might even hold back their output for the time-being if they find it expedient, as the prices will soar again later on when the supply becomes limited.

**WAS TRYING TO HELP BOY.**

Poland, N. Y., School Teacher Was Helping Youth Charged With Murder.  
Auburn, N. Y., April 1.—New light was thrown on the murder of Lida Beecher near Poland, Herkimer county, last Friday night, in the text of a letter which she wrote to the George Junior Republic on March 9. It substantiates the statement by her brother, Willis Beecher, last night when he said: "Lida had nothing at all to do with Jean Gianini's confinement in the Utica reform school. She was interested in him because he was backward and she wanted to help him to make a man of himself. She was intensely interested in teaching and here was a problem for her to solve, and she tried to do the best for the boy by suggesting that he go to the Junior Republic."  
Miss Beecher's letter says in part: "Have you room for one more citizen, a boy of 15. He is a good hearted boy, one of my pupils last year and one of my most interesting boys. The father thinks a lot of the boy and has tried to do what he could for him. He dislikes school work.  
He got a working certificate with his father's consent and got work in the mills four miles from here. He became restless. I don't know what the trouble was, but he got \$5 and started somewhere away from home. He was later caught and sent to Utica. On his return here he had nothing in view.  
"If he could get in some place like the George Junior Republic where he would receive a little kind treatment as well as hard work it would be fine for him. He responds to kindness very readily. He is not a bad boy by any means, he is simply unhappy at home. He is ambitious and has other fine qualities that would develop if he only had a little guidance to show him that he really could amount to something if he chooses to."  
"I had a little talk with Jean to-night and he seemed to be quite interested when I explained as well as I could what was expected of him."  
Gianini is held in the Herkimer county jail on the charge of murdering Miss Beecher, whose funeral was held in Seneca, near here, yesterday.
