THE FIGHT ON REPEAL OF PANAMA TOLLS.

In spite of Speaker Champ Clark's vehement declarations that all was well and friendly between him and President Wilson, there is a suspicion in many quarters that his opposition to the bill repealing toll exemptions for American coastwise shipping through the Panama canal was not entirely without the force of personal pique back of it. If it was not, then Speaker Clark has recovered most rapidly and most completely from a severe case of grinch which developed when Wilson defeated him at the Baltimore convention. It was not long since that Clark was credited with saying that he ought to be the president of the United States right now instead of Woodrow Wilson, showing that he still felt the rattle and sting of defeat after having held for some time the highest vote in the national Democratic convention. Thus for Clark to come out and declare on the floor of the House, as he did on Tuesday, that there was no personal bad feeling between himself and the present occupant of the White House and that, in fact, they are bosom friends, was almost too violent a change for the general public to comprehend.

But whatever may have been the reasons underlying Speaker Clark's opposition to the bill repealing the tolls exemption, there is no doubt about the signal triumph of President Wilson. The occasion was one of his most severe tests since he came to the presidency because of the fact that he found his own party divided to a certain extent and with a very active wing of it fighting tooth and nail to defeat the administration. The Wilson victory over the so-called leaders of the party in the House thus demonstrates anew that he is still the supreme leader of the party and that if orders are to be given they will have to come finally from him. We believe that President Wilson's stand in this matter was based on a high conception of national honor and that it was solely for that reason that he stood firm as a rock for the principle which he early espoused. Therefore, the step toward the realization of that high conception is the greater triumph. It is likely that the Senate will pass the bill, largely because of the influence which Senator Lodge of Massachusetts has brought to bear in favor of the principle involved.

NEW RATES ORDER SUSPENDED.

In Case of Franklin County and Champlain Valley Telephone Co's.

Justice John H. Watson has signed the application of the Franklin County Telephone company and the Champlain Valley Telephone company for suspension of the recent rate order issued by the public service commission pending appeal and determination of the rate matter in supreme court. The application was supported by the state except that the state asked that the order should be conditional on repayment of excess charges paid by subscribers from the date of the order in case the order of the public service commission is sustained, and the petition was amended to that effect and signed.

W. A. Graham was counsel for the state and Stickney & Sargent for the telephone companies. The suspension of the order is a matter of form in order to allow the supreme court to pass on the question raised at the May term.

The order of the public service commission making certain reductions in certain telephone rates of these companies was to become effective 30 days from March 14.

WITH CAPITAL 100 MILLIONS.

New Federal Banking System Figures Announced.

Washington, April 2.—The new federal reserve banking system will start business with a total authorized capital of about one hundred million dollars for all reserve banks no matter how many institutions the organization committee decides to set up.

The fact became apparent when the figures were made public for all national banks responding to the last call of the comptroller of currency made March 4.


