The "Ulster revolution" holds itself in abeyance.

The probable transfer of authority in the Progressive party of the second congressional district in Vermont is indicated by the announcement that the "opening gun of the campaign" is to be fired in Brattleboro rather than in or about Montpelier.

With the winter visitor season still in full swing and with hotels filled with guests from many parts of the country, St. Augustine, Fla., was fortunate that it passed through a great fire without a large casualty list on Thursday morning. Injury to two persons only was a record which may be considered very fortunate, indeed, when the number of people endangered is taken into consideration. The property loss is likely to be met by the construction of new and better hotels in the ancient city of the peninsular state.

THE TELEPHONE IN RURAL DISTRICTS.

The findings of the state board of appeals on the appraisals of telephone systems for the purposes of taxation do not vary greatly from the appraisal made by the state tax commissioner, Charles A. Plumley; indeed, they are so near his figures as to constitute virtual vindication of his judgment. In the case of the small and struggling companies throughout the state, it is gratifying that they have been given the benefit of the lower appraisal because most of them are none too well fixed, and added taxation would prove a real burden and perhaps more than they could stand. In their small way they are filling an important part in the life of the places where the population is scattered and the chances for the people to get together in business and social meetings are slight by reason of the distances intervening between houses and poor traveling conditions in a considerable part of each year. For those small companies to be taxed out of existence or so reduced in resources as to cause curtailment of the already slight service would be a serious handicap on the development of the rural districts of the state. The telephone can, and does, play the part of an important factor in building up the remote districts; and, by the same token, it serves to keep many people on the farm, who otherwise would cast their lot in cities and villages where they would have the benefit of community life. As long as they have telephone connection with their friends and neighbors they are somewhat more content to remain in the back farm districts and to prevent great tracts of land from going into disuse. Thus the telephone companies which serve those people should be encouraged into continued service rather than to be burdened too much with taxation.
