To Attend Anniversary of Old Rockingham Meeting House Association.

Bellows Falls, April 8.—The annual meeting of the executive committee of

the Old Rockingham Meeting House association was held Monday afternoon at the town clerk's office, First Vice President N. G. Williams in the chair. The reports of the past year's work showed that the permanent fund of the association had increased to \$132.43. The date of the annual meeting was fixed as Monday evening, April 27, in the Congregational church. The committee of arrangements was chosen as L. S. Hayes, Dr. E. R. Campbell and W. E. Stockwell.
