J. Ward Carver and Harry H. Patch returned last night from a fishing trip to Marshfield with a creel of brook trout that caused less fortunate disciples of Izaak Walton to feel the pangs of envy that inevitably come when a superior catch is exhibited before the stay-at-homes. Senator Carver and his side partner on the big trout time, struck out from Marshfield village in the early afternoon and were soon wrestling with some of the big fellows that were camping for the day in the small brook over former Molly's falls. In less than two hours an even dozen trout were tucked away in the creel and when weighed at Marshfield, the 12 tipped the beam at 10 pounds. Old fishermen of the corn cob school of angling told the Barre men that no bigger trout were ever raised in Marshfield.

Harry Webber of Hoboken, N. J., who claims no kin with the well-known member of the Webber family, surnamed Harry, who also figured in some momentous doings in his home city some time since, pleaded guilty before Magistrate H. W. Scott in city court to-day to a charge of vagrancy. 
