

Barre's share of the state school tax to be paid this year is \$5,089.27 and a warrant in favor of State Treasurer Walter F. Scott has been drawn by the city treasurer and approved by the city council. A portion of this money will be diverted to the support of rural schools. The city's state highway tax this year is \$3,180.79.

Alexander McKenzie, who was associated with Joseph Long & Co. in the work of changing the river bed on Prospect street, and who later had charge of the construction work on the cement dam at the Trow & Holden plant, was a visitor in the city recently, calling on W. Before the end of the present week it is expected that the street department will have finished the strip of permanent highway which was started sometime before Labor day on Quarry street. The work has taken longer than the estimated time, but the department has the county supervisor's own word for it that the road is permanent in fact as well as in name. State Highway Commissioner Stoddard B. Bates of Derby inspected the work last week and approved it unqualifiedly. Originally it was calculated to extend the permanent work from the Barre Town line to the Barre & Chelsea railroad crossing, but a stand taken by the council last night has made it possible for the road builders to continue the permanent section to South Main street.

City hall is soon to have a flag staff and an up-to-date copy of the star spangled banner that may be used on holidays and other festive occasions. For ever so long a time other public buildings in the city, including the federal building, which flies its own flag every day in the year, the fire station and the schoolhouses, have had the flag flying on stated holidays, but for some reason which no one seems able to explain clearly, the people's house at the corner of North Main and Prospect street has never had an official flag. City hall has held up one end of the balyard which supported a campaign flag hung across the street, but that is about all. Now the city council has made amends for the neglect of the past by instructing the city clerk to purchase a flag that will befit the dignity of any and all occasions on which it may be used, and a flag staff to go with it.


Mrs. Stella Lavolette of North Main street returned this morning from Boston, where she has been attending the fall millinery openings.
