China has troubles enough already without dragging her into war in which she has at present no direct interest.

THE REAL KING OF FOOTBALL.

Among the architects of football fortunes the premier honors in the eastern section of the country, if not of the whole area, must be awarded to P. D. Haughton of Harvard university. It is true that Haughton had a wealth of material from which to shape a football team, but no more valuable material than foregatherers in the shades of many a collegiate institution. Without a doubt Yale university had as good individual football players during the season brought to a close last Saturday as Harvard had, yet Yale made a woefully weak showing when brought in opposition to the machine which Haughton had fashioned out of his material. Much of the failure of the Yale team is to be laid to the unfortunate selection of coaches and then to the virtual shifting of authority and systems a few weeks prior to the climax of the season. It was out of the question that a team founded on such shifty ground could cope with an aggregation which had had the benefits of uninterrupted development along an established policy; the latter must, of necessity, work with greater union and with more developed football sense. And so it proved on Saturday to be the discomfit-



TAFT SEES G. O. P. VICTORY.

But He Will Not Be Candidate, He Tells Friends.

Washington, Nov. 22.—Former President Taft, here for the meeting of the American Red Cross executive committee, told his friends that "it looks like a Republican come-back next year."

"I have recently returned from a trip across the continent," he said, "and it seems to me the American business man, even the man who is now profiting by 'war prosperity,' isn't satisfied with the Democratic program or the Democratic achievements. The trend is back to Republicanism."

"The Democrats apparently must rely on Republican votes with which to pass a preparedness program. Their own party is divided. They face an increasing national deficit. Where are they going to raise the money and how? I doubt very seriously whether the Republicans will support a bond issue."

Mr. Taft said he is not a candidate for the presidency. He presided at the Red Cross committee meeting.

Barre granite was used in a notable memorial recently erected over the grave of Metallak, a famous old St. Francis Indian in the little North Hill cemetery near Stewartstown, N. H., and New Hampshire exchanges have recently given on the monument and the man whose memory it serves to preserve a considerable amount of space. Older residents of the Connecticut river valley remember the St. Francis chief for his good works. In old age he abandoned the game trails and moved to a little cabin on Magalloway, there to remain until his death. John H. Emerson, a well known New Hampshire man, being interested in historical subjects, long desired to perpetuate the memory of the chief and finally had the satisfaction of seeing his wish gratified. The monument, as stated already, is of Barre granite polished face with rock pitched ends and back. It is discernible for a number of miles. On the stone is the inscription, "Metallak, the lone Indian of the Magalloway; died about 1850; last of the Coashaukes; erected 1915 by John H. Emerson." It is expected that the Metallak club, a strong social organization of Lancaster, N. H., will conduct dedicatory exercises at the monument next summer.
