REDMOND NEAR DANGER.

Irish Nationalist Leader Is at the Front in France.

London, Nov. 22.—John Redmond's trip to the front for the purpose of inspecting the Irish regiments is being followed with great interest in the United Kingdom. The tour of the Irish Nationalist leader opened dramatically, according to the accounts forwarded by the correspondents.

Mr. Redmond was making an inspection of a battalion of the Royal Munster Fusiliers, which had taken a notable part in the fighting from the first days of the British entry into France. The inspection took place close to the trenches, and a German aeroplane appeared overhead just as Mr. Redmond arrived.

The British artillery opened on the aeroplane from all directions, some shell fragments fell unpleasantly near to Mr. Redmond and his party, and the inspection trip was abruptly concluded.

The Irish leader has been making speeches to the troops, and they have been received with unbounded enthusiasm.
