War sufferers were remembered yesterday throughout the Roman Catholic diocese of Burlington, when a special offering was taken in all churches and missions for the Belgian and Polish relief fund, the offering being made at the suggestion of Rt. Rev. J. J. Rice, the diocesan head. The offering at St. Monica's church was taken at the morning masses. Seldom in the course of a deer season are there chronicled two killings by one family, but Mr. and Mrs. John Magnaghi of North Main street, who have been passing two weeks with a party of Barre people in the woods of Pittsfield, believe they have hung up a record in the "huntsman's" books. The big drive on the venison country, on the day after the camp was opened Mrs. Magnaghi brought down with her own rifle a 125-pound buck. For nearly a week she "had the edge" on the men hunters in the camp and it was not until her husband one day pulled into the clearing a handsome doe that the spell was broken.
