

ABOUT THE STATE

It is expected that the new Grace Methodist church in St. Johnsbury will be dedicated at Easter time. It takes the place of the structure destroyed by fire.

George C. Dow, one of the best known passenger conductors in the Northwest, and a native of Lyndonville, died at Brainerd, Minn., recently of blood poisoning. He was 73 years old.

Joseph Hunter was seriously injured a few days ago while working in the woods in Peacham. A tree lodged and then fell, throwing Mr. Hunter down, spraining his ankle and breaking the ligaments in his heel.

A train from the middle west of Canada passed through Wells River Wednesday which was made up of 31 freight cars loaded with steel tubing to be shipped abroad to be made into carriages. The night before 64 cars loaded with the same material passed through the same point.

The large hotel barn in Lincoln, owned by W. E. Butterfield, was burned Monday night with most of its contents. Otto Butterfield, a tenant, lost 20 cords of wood and another tenant lost some hay. The loss is partially covered by insurance. The Methodist church, only 60 feet away, was saved by the quick work of the townspeople.

James Leamy, sr., probably the oldest station master in Vermont, died at his home in West Rutland Tuesday of grippe, complicated with pneumonia, at the age of 78 years. He became station agent at Fair Haven in 1863, served in the same capacity at Castleton and in 1867 was made station agent at West Rutland, which position he held until his death.

Will Manufacture Condensed Milk. The L. C. Brigham company of Cambridge, Mass., has leased the plant of the Boston Dairy company at Bellows Falls and will soon begin the making of condensed milk, which was manufactured by the dairy company up to the time it met with financial difficulties almost two years ago. The Cambridge company has leased the plant, which is in good condition, for one year, with the option of buying.

SUING FOR INJURED BOY. Guardian for Walter Hollister in Action Against Charles P. Oatman.

On the night of September 16 last the Hollister boy, who is 16 years old, was shot in the face with a charge of peas from a shotgun while in the act of stealing grapes from the Oatman garden on Pleasant street. The boy was hurried to the Samaritan hospital in Troy and remained at the institution for several weeks. At the hospital it was found that one of the eyes was completely destroyed and that the sight of the other was so injured that there was no hope of saving it.

Mr. Oatman was given a preliminary hearing before Municipal Judge Holden and held for the grand jury which met in December. After a hearing the grand jury failed to return an indictment.

The damage suit was filed soon after the shooting. Collins M. Graves and Daniel A. Guitman of this village are appearing for the boy and Mr. Oatman is represented by James K. Batchelder of Arlington and Clarke C. Pitts of Brattleboro.

Verdict in Alienation Suit. The jury in the case of Truman D. Kimball of Pownal vs. Elmer Leroy of Searsburg, in which Kimball seeks to recover \$10,000 for the alienation of his wife's affections, retired at 5:30 Wednesday night. They remained in the jury room all night. At 9:30 yesterday morning they came into court for instructions and again retired. Late in the forenoon they came in with a verdict for the plaintiff to recover \$243 and costs.

The verdict was on two counts. The jury found against the defendant on the charge of enticing away the wife of the plaintiff, but on the second count of a more serious nature held him blameless.

THIEVES GOT \$1.50. By Breaking Into Railroad Station in Winooski.

Winooski, Jan. 14.—Burglars broke into the local railway station sometime during Wednesday night and got away with about \$1.50 in pennies which belonged to the Western Union and made an unsuccessful attempt to enter the freight office across from the station. The burglars gained entrance to the station by breaking a pane of glass in the window on the north or platform side of the building.

Mr. Kellogg, the agent, discovered the robbery when he went to the station Thursday morning for the day's work. Four panes of glass were broken in the window on the south side of the freight office in an effort to gain entrance to the building, but it seems that the burglars could not force the window and did not enter the office. A freight car was on the siding directly in front of the window which the burglars tried to force. There is a narrow platform between the freight office and the siding and the burglars could have done their work of forcing an entrance unobserved without close scrutiny.

The local station has been a mark for burglars for some time, and the robbery Wednesday night was but one of several committed within a year.

A CIVIL WAR MAN GONE. John H. Evans of Bennington Passed Away from Pneumonia.

Bennington, Jan. 14.—John H. Evans, aged 77, who for the past 25 years has been one of the highly esteemed residents of Bennington, passed away at his home on Main street yesterday after a ten-day illness with pneumonia.

Mr. Evans was born in Woodford, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ethel Evans, and spent his early life in that town, his father afterward moving the family to Bennington, where at the outbreak of the Rebellion, John Evans enlisted in Co. A, 4th Vermont volunteers. There are but three other local men now living who were members of that company, Henry G. Camp, Sheriff Godfrey and Irving E. Gibson. The fourth local man in the war in proportion to its total than any other Vermont regiment.

John Evans served in the war from

1861 to 1863 and saw several severe engagements. He was finally stricken with typhoid fever near Harrison's Landing and was ordered to a hospital in Philadelphia.

During his confinement there he fell in love with his nurse, Miss Mary Sewell, who had charge of the institution, and at the close of the war they were married. They settled in Philadelphia, in which city they lived until Mrs. Evans' death 20 years later.

His second wife was Miss Caroline Cox of Philadelphia, who survives him. Shortly after his second marriage he moved to this village and has been almost a continual resident since. During the past 25 years he has engaged in the lumber business to some extent and taken part in various enterprises with his brothers.

Besides his widow he is survived by two brothers, Franklin N. Evans of Hadonfield, N. J., Calvin Evans of this town, and two sisters, Miss Harriet Evans of Bennington and Mrs. B. Townsend of North Adams, Mass. He had no children.
