NOT CONSTITUTIONAL

Mr. Crocker Attacks Boston & Maine Reorganization Plan

Boston, Feb. 18.—Conrad W. Crocker, an attorney for the Boston & Maine Minority Stockholders' association, declared at a legislative hearing yesterday that the plan for reorganization issued last week by the directors was unconstitutional and that his association would carry the question to the state supreme court.

Mr. Crocker and several other attorneys for the minority association spoke in favor of two bills before the legislature, one providing for state aid and the other repealing the reorganization act passed in this state last year. They claimed that the assessment provision in the reorganization plan was illegal.

HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

Mr. Sweeney, foreman of the bridge construction gang at St. Johnsbury Center, was considerably burned about the head recently when some tar which he was heating caught fire.

Mrs. Charles Cushing of Montreal, who has been spending a few days in St. Albans, has four sons fighting in the trenches of the English army and a daughter who is giving her service in a hospital at the front.

The Burlington Traction company has ordered another convertible electric car for service between that city and Essex Junction, which will seat 48 persons. It will go into use in the spring.

E. S. Robinson, rural carrier, No. 1, from Morrisville postoffice, completed 14 years service Monday. Mr. Robinson has made in that time, 4045 trips and driven 86,967 miles, a distance of nearly three and a half times around the earth.

Lieut. Gov. Hale K. Darling and Arthur Howard, editor of The Advance, have been secured for a debate at Orleans, Feb. 24, on the direct primary bill. Mr. Howard will speak in favor of the bill, and Mr. Darling in opposition.

When the automobile run by Mr. Far-num skidded and ran into the side of a bridge at St. Johnsbury Center a few days ago, as he was driving from St. Johnsbury to his home in Lyndon, Mrs. Hall, an occupant of the car, was thrown headfirst through the wind shield, cutting her somewhat. The others in the car were not injured.

Saxtons River Man Dies of Burns.

John Baxter Minard, 77, of Saxtons River, died Wednesday evening as the result of burns which he received January 16, when his house in Saxtons River was destroyed. At the time of the fire Mr. Minard opened a door and the flames enveloped him, burning the top of his head very seriously, also his face and hands, and he inhaled fire. He was taken to the home of Dr. W. D. Bowen, where he had been ever since, being unconscious much of the time.

Mr. Minard was born in Westminster West, Dec. 16, 1838, a son of John and Caroline (Webb) Minard. He married Kate Williams, whose death occurred 30 or more years ago. For his second wife he married Charlotte (Davis) Billings, who died about 10 years ago, soon after their removal to Saxtons River.

Until going to Saxtons River, Mr. Minard was a resident in Westminster, his occupation being that of a farmer, and he was prominent in the affairs of the town, but he gave up farming on going to Saxtons River. He was a selectman from 1888 to 1893 and again from 1899 to 1905, and was a lister in the years 1883, 1884, 1888 and 1894. For eight years he had been a lister for the town of Rockingham. He was a member of King Solomon's temple, lodge of Masons in Bellows Falls.

A daughter, Kate Williams, died in 1894 at the age of 32 years. She had been
