up the army and navy bills, the tariff, Philippine and shipping bills, and other measures in the administration legislative programme.

The speaker and Mr. Kitchin told the president they believed satisfactory progress was being made, but that they would consult other leaders, and arrange for the order in which the administration bills would be considered.

The president asked for prompt attention particularly for the army and navy bills and the tariff commission bill.

Representative Tinkham of Massachusetts, a member of the House committee on the District of Columbia, introduced the committee bill providing for the better care of juveniles of the district, on the floor of the House yesterday. He stated, however, that he would later move to substitute a bill of his own which is similar to the one under consideration in almost every respect, but makes some minor changes.

Mr. Tinkham said that he hoped that the system which would be introduced in the district if the bill should pass, would be a model for the states to follow, and declared that the modern theory in the care of the juvenile was to consider the children as wards of the state, and have the state give them parental care. To-day, according to Mr. Tinkham, there are more than 1,000 children of the district who are treated entirely in accordance with criminal procedure, but under the new bill the child will not be summoned into court. He will be asked to come in. The records will be private and the judge will have broad discretionary powers in handling him.

## DROP ALL FOR DEFENSE, BORAH URGES SENATE

### Mexican Trouble Makes Immediate Work on Preparedness Programme Necessary.

Washington, March 14.—Senator Borah, Republican, urged the Senate yesterday to drop all other legislation and immediately consider the national preparedness programme, in view of consequences that might arise from the decision to pursue Villa in Mexico.

Chairman Chamberlain of the military committee told the Senate that in his opinion the United States army did not have enough soldiers to cope with Mexico or enough equipment. He added he would not be surprised to see all Mexicans rally around Villa.

## WOMEN IN RAIDING ZEPPELIN

### High-Topped Kid Boots Found in Wreckage of Big Airship.

Paris, March 14.—The Petit Parisien prints a circumstantial story indicating that women were aboard the Zeppelin destroyed by the French recently at Revin.

In the burning wreckage were discovered two slender feet clad in high-topped fashionable kid boots, the newspaper asserted.

## BRITAIN SEEKS TO RELEASE MORE MEN FOR SERVICE

### List of Exempted Occupations to Be Reduced and Women to Replace Younger Men.

London, March 14.—With a view to liberating more men for active service in the army the government has revised the list of starred occupations, employment in which has exempted workmen hitherto. It is expected official details will be issued immediately.

The revision is in accordance with the recent recommendation of the Earl of Derby. In cases where it is found impossible to remove occupations altogether from the starred list men under thirty years will be replaced by women or older men.

## PRESSING THE ARMY BILL

### It May Come Up This Week in the Senate

### PREPAREDNESS LEGISLATION

### The Part of Wisdom, Is the Feeling in Several States

Washington, March 14.—The Senate will soon take up the new army bill and efforts will be made to press it to passage without needless delay, according to announcement in Senate military committee circles yesterday afternoon. Senator Chamberlain hopes to bring up the bill for consideration this week.

While it cannot be said this is due to the Mexican situation, there is no doubt a feeling in administration circles and in Congress, among proponents of preparedness, that it would be the part of wisdom to hasten preparedness legislation.

Senator Chamberlain, as chairman of the military committee, has asked for certain reports from the war department on the new Senate bill. As soon as they arrive, he wants to push the measure. The conference at the White House yesterday between the president, Speaker Clark and Leader Kitchin was for the purpose of speeding up legislation and especially preparedness legislation.

## DELAY GEORGIA CAMP TILL MAY

### Postponement of a Month Announced Because of Mexican Situation.

New York, March 14.—Postponement of the opening of the military training camp at Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., because of the Mexican expedition, was announced yesterday by Major General Leonard Wood. The first division of the camp will open on May 3 instead of on April 3, as originally planned. The training of the second contingent, which begins on May 3, will not be deferred, it was announced, both camps to be consolidated at that time.

## EMBARGO ON ARMS BILLED FOR MEXICO

### San Francisco Closed to Export of Munitions According to Instructions from Washington.

San Francisco, March 14.—An embargo on shipments of war munitions from this port to Mexican ports was declared yesterday by John O. Davis, collector of the port, in accordance with instructions from Washington.
