

RUSSIANS LOSE 20,000 AT VILNA

Attack on Von Hindenburg's Line to Aid Verdun

THE AUSTRIANS FALL BACK

Front Is Withdrawn on the Strya, Vienna Admits

London, March 21.—Heavy Russian attacks on both the Austrian and German fronts shifted interest temporarily yesterday from the waning German offensive around Verdun.

An official statement from the Austrian war office yesterday admitted the Austrians were compelled to give ground near the Vojecko Bridgehead. The Slavs attacked violently with grenades, following an artillery bombardment.

"Our defense line was somewhat withdrawn," admitted the Austrian war office, "but all attacks at other points were repulsed."

Berlin dispatches asserted that the Russians lost 20,000 in killed, wounded and prisoners in a sudden offensive against Von Hindenburg's lines on a sixty-mile front in the Vilna region. The German positions were bombarded for twenty-four hours previous to the attack, but the artillery preparation was ineffective. Berlin reported Von Hindenburg's men met the offensive with a steady stream of machine gun fire.

Petrograd dispatches yesterday were silent on the new Russian offensive. It was believed here that the Russian strokes were delivered to prevent the shifting of more German troops to the western front.

PAGE TO LEAVE ROME FOR REST.

Washington, March 21.—Thomas Nelson Page, American ambassador to Italy, has notified the state department that he expects to take a vacation and return to the United States on a visit. He will leave Rome about April 1, if the embassy business permits.

AMENDMENT IS BEATEN

House Down the Proposed Kahn Army Bill Increase

VOTE 183 TO 103 UPON ROLL-CALL

The Proposal for Larger Increase Killed Off-hand

Washington, March 21.—Representative Kahn's proposal to put the regular army at 220,000 men, an increase of 80,000 over the administration bill, was lost in the House yesterday by a vote of 183 to 103. The House then proceeded to other amendments.

A proposal to outdo Kahn amendment by making the army 250,000 men, was lost without a roll call. A rising vote on the Kahn amendment itself showed 22 for it and 153 against it. It was then that Mr. Kahn demanded a record vote.

Representative Gardner, Republican, declared the Hay bill was to surrender to the pacifist element. After all the discussion and the president's appeal for preparedness, he said, "the mountain had produced a ridiculous mouse."

Representative Crago, Republican, of Pennsylvania, favored the amendment.

Representative Kahn's amendment was taken up for two hours' debate yesterday when the House resumed work on the measure.

DUTCH SHIPPERS THREATENING TO SUSPEND SERVICE

Must Ascertain Germany's Intentions Regarding Sea Warfare—Vessels Held at Falmouth, England.

Amsterdam, March 21.—The Hindelblad says it has learned that the Netherlands and the Rotterdam Lloyd steamship companies are seriously contemplating the suspension of their whole service until Germany clearly defines her intentions regarding sea warfare. Their ships, the Prins des Nederlanden and Tambora, homeward bound from Java, have been ordered to wait at Falmouth for further orders, according to the newspaper.
