

**WIFE FAVORS DEATH SENTENCE FOR WAITE**

Believes the Doctor Would Gain His Liberty in a Few Years if Sent to Matherwan as Insane.

New York, May 17.—Arrangements for the trial of Dr. Arthur Warren Waite on the charge of poisoning his father-in-law, John E. Peck, Grand Rapids, Mich., millionaire, were practically completed yesterday at a conference between Attorney Swann and Mrs. Clara Peck Waite, wife of the defendant.

She is ready to testify against the

confessed slayer of her father and her mother if necessary.

Though opposed to capital punishment, Mrs. Waite is willing that it be applied in the case of her husband, fearing that if he were sent to Matherwan that he would, by his graciousness of manner, gain his liberty in a few years.

"The ideal he represented to me," she said, "will be one that I shall always care about; any girl would. But his wasn't that ideal. He was a different person to me. He always deceived me."

Mrs. Waite laughed ironically when she recalled that some of the telephone calls her husband made to her to apologize for not being home to lunch and dinner came from the Plaza hotel, where he was registered with the beautiful Mrs. Margaret Horton as man and wife.

**NEUTRAL SHIPS MUST NOT FACE U-BOATS**

Count Von Bernstorff in Note to Lansing Warns Neutral Nations.

Washington, May 17.—Germany, in a note presented to Secretary Lansing by Count Von Bernstorff yesterday, warns neutral governments that merchant ships flying neutral flags must obey the provisions of international law in regard to their conduct when stopped by a German submarine and that they incur danger should they turn their ships in the direction of a submarine.

**HOUSE AGREES TO VOTE ON SHIP BILL FRIDAY**

It Adopts Rule to Take Up the Administration Measure.

Washington, May 17.—Friday at 4 o'clock the House will vote on the administration shipping bill, it was decided yesterday afternoon, when a rule to the effect was adopted, 196 to 144, after a lively debate.

Debate was chiefly on the feature of the rule limiting Friday's debate to five hours. Representative Miller of Pennsylvania, Republican, supported the rule.

"My God, isn't there enough talk here!" Miller said. "How long do you want to talk—for all eternity!"

Campbell of Kansas and Lenroot, Wisconsin, denounced the rule as a "throttler." This bill puts into the hands of seven men the power to drive the American flag from every port in the world," Lenroot said. Floor Leader Kitchin urged adoption of the rule.

"We Democrats have a majority on this side," he said. "We can run this House. It is high time we quit talking and start legislating. If we work together we can't get out of here by July 30."

Modified so as not to offend Democrats who do not believe in government ownership, the ship bill yesterday began its course in the House. Its passage, with a few Republican votes added to the Democratic majority, was predicted by administration leaders.

The provision expected to gain the support of conservative Democrats forbids the government to operate the line more than five years after the close of the European war. If this measure passes the House, and the House and the Senate formally agree on the military bill and rural credits bill, before the convention in June, Democratic leaders say they will be pleased.

**CAN'T ALLOW FOOD TO REACH GERMANY BY MAIL**

Great Britain, However, Striving to Eliminate Delays and Interference to American Mails.

Washington, May 17.—The British ambassador, Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, told Secretary Lansing yesterday that his government was striving to eliminate the delays and interferences to mails to which the United States is again about to make protest, but that Great Britain could not relinquish its claim to the right to prevent the use of mails for transportation of goods or information by its enemies.

**FINDS ENGINEER RESPONSIBLE**

Coroner Reports That Loss of Life Was Due to His "Failure and Carelessness."

South Kingston, R. I., May 17.—A report that Charles H. Mansfield, engineer of the Gilt Edge express, was responsible for the collision with a local train on the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad at the Bradford station on April 17, in which five persons were killed and a score injured, was filed in the superior court yesterday by Coroner Everett A. Kingsley. The coroner held that Mansfield had run by signals properly set against him and specifically asserted that the death of Miss Janet Clark of Westbury, one of the wreck victims, was attributable to his "failure and carelessness."
