GOOD CONVENTION HELD.

Washington County Association of Congregational Churches.

Cabot, June 28.—There were 90 persons in attendance at the 80th annual meeting of the Washington County Association of Congregational Churches, which was held yesterday, 22 of the number being from Barre. The general subject of the meeting was "The Task."

The morning session was largely devoted to business matters after the delegates had been welcomed by Rev. Morton W. Hale. In the afternoon there was a devotional service, conducted by Rev. Amos J. Lord, followed by papers and discussions, the numbers being: "Our Task in Making God's Word Known in Vermont," Rev. Charles A. Boyd; "The Christian's Task," Rev. S. Francis Howard; "The Minister's Task," (a) as a teacher of religion, Rev. Frank Blomfield, (b) as a comrade, Rev. F. G. Aylmore, (c) as an influence in public thought and affairs, Rev. J. W. Barnett, (d) as a comforter, Rev. William A. Remelle; sermon, Rev. James B. Sargent; Lord's supper, Rev. Stanley F. Blomfield and Rev. William L. Boicourt.

In the evening the feature was the address on "The Greater Works and Supreme Task of the Church of Jesus Christ," by Rev. Edward P. Drew of Worcester, Mass., who is a native of Cabot. The address was one of the best ever heard in the association. It was preceded by a devotional service conducted by Rev. Charles H. Chaplin and was followed by "quiet moments," conducted by Rev. James Ramage.
