

Vermont's tourist season is at its height.

The national Progressive party flutters around like a hen with her head cut off.

It is to be observed that the captain of the Deutschland exercised the greater part of valor by ducking below the surface of the water a mile inside of the three-mile limit. He proved that not every German is made of foolhardiness.

The candidates for vice-president are bound to thrust themselves into the limelight. It was stated that Marshall was planning to notify the Democratic national committee that he was nominated for the second position on their ticket. Now comes Charles W. Fairbanks with a statement that he is going out on the stump, and this announcement, too, before he has been notified that he was nominated for vice-president.

Governor McCall of Massachusetts stepped on somebody's toes in restoring Gardner W. Pearson to be adjutant general of the state troops in place of Adjutant General Cole, resigned. And the somebody referred to has been Governor McCall's best friend and most prominent booster. Heretofore people had been led to believe that Governor McCall could do no wrong, according to the judgment of this best friend and booster.

The Russian Cossacks were always pictured as most daring troopers, and they are proving their reputation during the present campaign against the Teutons along the Dnieper. As a matter of fact, cavalry is being used more now on both the great war fronts than since the opening of the war. If the armies should ever come to a clash on the open ground far from trenches the cavalry would come into its own again as one of the effective arms of

military service. For two years, the mounted soldiers have had little chance to show their worth and in consequence they were turned into infantry and they burrowed into the ground just as their foot compatriots had been doing. The eastern front with far less intricate systems of trench formations is better adapted to the use of the cavalry, and mounted troops have been used there off and on since the war was inaugurated. They have proved very valuable aids there, too.

We trust that General Funston will meet with good success in driving all the "sissy" newspaper correspondents from the American camps on the Rio Grande river. We also trust that he will have equal success in banishing the lying newspaper correspondents who persistently tell things incorrectly or who, when hard up for real news, take to faking stories about alleged conditions which exist only in their imagination. The latter are not only a disgrace to their profession but they are a real menace to the good intentions of the United States government in its conduct of the troop activities on the international boundary. The lying correspondents ought to be set to work at hard manual labor and to be kept there until they shall have gained a change of attitude, until they shall have acquired a sense of responsibility toward their fellow-men. We commend that method of procedure to General Funston, if such a course of action is possible.

Carranza has agreed to the United States plan of a conference on the disputes between the United States and the de facto government of Mexico. That being the case, the United States should make haste to pin him down to that position. By another 24 hours he may have changed his position entirely, so thoroughly unstable is he, much like his own government. However, it is distinctly encouraging that he has been induced to agree to a plan of mediation of difficulties, or at least an attempt to agree to plans. There is no certainty whatever that the disputants will come to an amicable arrangement, but the attempt to reach an agreement is far preferable to putting the matter out to arbitration. From this time on we must expect a long drawn out haggling over the situation and the terms of the pro-

posed agreement. If the troops are to be maintained on the border in their entirety pending the adjustment of the points at issue it will be many more months before the first Vermont infantry sees home.

### SHORTAGE OF PRINT PAPER.

There is no doubt that publishers of newspapers in the United States are facing a serious condition as regards securing their stock of print paper, in view of the fact that advances in price have been as high as 25 and 35 per cent within a short time and in view also of the reported shortage of the supply on the market. Some publishers asserted at the hearing before the federal trade commission that when they desired extra paper they were forced to pay from 50 to 100 per cent more for it. This increased cost of paper has been largely instrumental in causing the increase in the selling price of several large newspapers during the past few months and is likely to force many others to do the same. The tendency throughout the whole country is toward raising the selling price of the newspapers.

At the same time many of the newspapers are reaching agreements to cut down the number of pages in their regular editions, to refuse the return of unsold copies and to print just the bare number of papers to meet the demands of their circulation. Many of the leading publishers of New York City have started the movement by coming to an understanding regarding waste of white paper, and it is expected that the publishers in every other city of size throughout the country will follow suit, while the newspaper publishers in the small communities are likely to lend their co-operation in the movement to eliminate waste. The head of one of the greatest print paper manufacturing concerns in the company asserts that his mills are running at the highest efficiency ever known and that with a single exception the output cannot be increased by the addition of new material, while the supply on hand is being greatly decreased by the unusual demands during the summer months. Taking him at his word, there is no other way out of the difficulty than that the publishers of newspapers should join the movement to cut down the waste or the needless use of paper in "features" which can just as well be lopped off as not.
