GALLINGER AFTER RUBLEE Wants to Know by What Authority He Is Member of Trade Commission. Washington, Aug. 21.—Senator Gallinger Saturday introduced a resolution directing the chairman of the federal trade commission to inform the Senate at once by what authority George Rublee is now a member of the commission. Action was deferred until to-day. Senator Gallinger, after a long fight, based on personal grounds, prevented Rublee's confirmation, and he has been serving without compensation since March. A bill to provide compensation for Rublee's services up to the time of his rejection last June is pending in the House.

The president, on the other hand, now forces the fighting. His statement Saturday is a first appeal to public sentiment. It is still believed here in administration circles that the railroads must ultimately accept a proposal close to what he has advanced. The president's telegraphic request late Saturday afternoon to more western railroad officials to come to Washington means earnest parleys this week toward some understanding.

PASS COMPENSATION BILL. The Senate Action Follows That of the House. Washington, Aug. 21.—The workmen's compensation bill to provide uniform compensation for government employes when disabled and adequate benefits for their families in case of death was passed Saturday by the Senate, practically in the same form as it passed the House. Federal employes would receive two-third wages throughout their disability and provision is made for adequate attendance of injured to effect economy in preventing protracted compensation payments.
