BIG DOINGS AT STATE FAIR.

Indications point to extensive exhibits with amusement to please patrons.

White River Junction, Aug. 22.—With premiums in the several departments of the Vermont state fair, which will be held on the state fair grounds here September 12, 13, 14 and 15, aggregating \$20,000 and with purses for the trotting events reaching close to \$5,000, the commission having this state event in hand is again demonstrating its liberality. Exhibitors of cattle, horses, sheep and swine, and of all farm produce have high regard for the state fair. It pays them to make exhibits there, the premiums being of satisfying amounts. Breeders of cattle and horses from other states find at this fair judging is fair and that the premiums won are on the merit of the stock.

There is every promise of hotly contested racing on the tracks. The entries are large in all events. There will be two stake races, a 2:20 pace and a 2:20 trot, each with a purse of \$1,000. These two events have brought a big string of entries. Lovers of horse racing are promised a treat each day of the fair.

State Fish Commissioner Titcomb is arranging for an extensive exhibit of the fish that inhabit Vermont waters—a more comprehensive and complete exhibit than has yet been made.

The midway will be extensive. It will again be under the supervision of Superintendent Williams. Many things new in the line of out-door entertainment have already "booked in" and the midway will be fully occupied.
