HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

The enrollment at the Burlington high school may reach 700 this fall, as nearly 600 enrollment cards have already been received.

Mrs. Mary Hapgood Underhill's oldest resident, died Sunday at the age of 93 years, death being due to a general breaking down.

Silas Hicks of Readsboro dropped a box weighing between 400 and 500 pounds on his foot recently, crushing the big toe of his left foot.

John Brooks, arrested on a statutory charge in Brattleboro last week, was Thursday sentenced to not less than one and one-half nor more than two years in state prison.

When S. S. Washier of Brattleboro lost control of his Ford car Thursday, it ran into a bank and was badly damaged. Mr. Washier was thrown out and received a bad cut on his head.

Burlington citizens are trying to discover why they must pay \$1 more a ton for coal than Rutland. Burlington prices also vary with the different dealers, while Rutland prices are uniform.

The 22d annual reunion of the Bump family was held in Salisbury Wednesday, with 85 persons present. The oldest was Dr. Orlo M. Bump, aged 84 years, and the youngest was ten months old.

Miss Helen McKee and Miss Elizabeth Gremley, both graduate nurses of the Rutland hospital, are going to England as war nurses. Miss McKee's home is in Richmond, P. Q., and Miss Gremley's in Newcastle, N. B.

The longest stretch of state road ever built in one year in Pittsford has just been completed and is one mile and 92 feet long and 21 feet wide. It is made of three layers of crushed stone. Over 1,600 loads of stone and 500 loads of dirt were used.

J. A. Fowler of Ludlow died very suddenly Tuesday evening at the home of his son, Lucius C. Fowler, in Underhill, where he and his wife had been visiting since Saturday. Mr. Fowler was a resident of Randolph for many years before moving to Ludlow.

Mr. and Mrs. F. G. Houston, in a truck returning from Woodbury to Hardwick with a piano, were run into by a Woodbury auto, throwing them from the wagon seat and breaking Mrs. Houston's nose, besides otherwise bruising her and shaking her up.

E. E. Barber of Woodstock is suffering from a broken shoulder as the result of a fall from a wagon. He was sitting on the rear end of a lumber wagon when the team started without warning and fell backward, striking his head and shoulder on the ground.

F. C. Henderson of Brookline, Mass., while visiting in Colchester, caught near Sand Bar bridge a pickerel measuring about 40 inches in length. When the head of this pickerel was cut off, the tail of another fish which the pickerel had swallowed was seen, and the second fish measured 18 inches.

He was unloading hay in the barn when a rope broke and a hay fork fell, striking him on the head. He did not fully regain consciousness for two days.
